Egyptian forces are withdrawing from the Sinai Peninsula - to concentrate for the defense of the Suez Canal. Against - that expected British-French invasion. So announced - by Egyptian Premier Nasser today.

The Israelis report they re impossession of most of Sinai. Egyptian forces - in full retreat.

Some of them - trapped. The Gaza strip - map completely isolated. The capture of the City of Gaza - expected at any time. The Israelis report the capture of huge quantities of equipment. Egyptian casualties, killed, wounded and captured - estimated at five thousand.

The Israelis declaring - that their own losses are "less than one hundred killed."

The British-French today continued the sir war. Bombing Egypt - for the second day - military objectives at Cairo, Alexandria, and points along the Suez Canal - blasted.

The Egyptians declare - that wax bombs hit a ship in the canal - sinking it. Thereby - blocking the waterway. The British reply - that the ship, badly was bombed, was towed by the Egyptians to a position across the canal - so it would sink there.

One dispatch from Cairo tells of a rumor of Egyptian forces in battle with British-French troops.
But this xexix could not be confirmed - and there's ze
no indication that landings have taken place. Nothing
but bombing by the British and French - thus far.
With Naval forces - moving to positions at both ends
of the Suez Canal.

How long this air war phase will continue is a guess. Today, Headquarters at Cyprus declared the attacks will continue until Egypt sees "reason".
The Commander in Chief, British General Sir Charles
Keighley said: "The length of the operation depends
on how quickly Egypt accepts our terms."

Today, a French military spokesman would not reveal - whether or not landings for an invasion were imminent. "We cannot say," he declared. "whether there will or will not be landings tonight."
