atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons by China and France; - and the word "regrettable" in referring to on-going underground trats by the United States and Banni Russia. VIETNAM

North Vietnamese infantry - supported by dozens of tanks - today broke through the government defense line in Quang Tri Province then battled South Vietnamese paratroopers on the Plains below the My Chanh River. American wasplanes joined in the defense of the area - against a Communist push, some believe is the start of an offensive against the ancient capital of Him Hue. In Saigon, U S spokesmen say eight 🖝 American soldier.; were killed - twenty-seven wounded - and eleven missing or captured in combat action last week.

IRELAND

The militant provisional wing of the Irish Republican army announce **States** it will suspend quote - "offensive operations" - in North Ireland as of midnight this coming Monday <u>if</u> the British army declares u cease-fire in return. The British promptly accepted.

## SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court today handed down a decision

that would prohibit state and local governments from

carving out new school districts that would prevent

integration.

PIPELINE

Interior Secretary Rogers Morton says that any pipeline constructed across Canada wouldn't be ready to carry Alaskan oil to the United States before Nineteen Eighty-one at the very earliest. See Testifying before a congressional committee, Morton says a three thousand mile trans-canadian pipeline would and cost about seventy-six billion dollars including tankers to carry the oil from the Alaskan port of Valdez. He wants to go ahead with his own proposal to construct the pipeline southmard across and speeding up the delivery Alaska instead date for the much needed petroleum from the Arotic

coast.

The attempt to install listen-in microphones in the Democratic National Committees headquarters in Washington revives memories of some other goings on in the nation's capital.
