In Saigon, General Westmoreland, told Defense Secretary McNamara that American troops are "slowly and steadily" winning the war; - but more manpower is needed. And from all assessments - McNamara was told it will be a long and costly war. It was not disclosed How many additional troops General Westmoreland requested, we don't know; but he had been expected to ask for perhaps one hundred more to step up thousand to quicken the pace of the war. If such a request it would mean at least a partial mobilization of reserves.

Heavy new fighting erupted today in the demilitarized zone where American Marines are holding back an invasion attempt by elements of five North Vietnamese divisions. Elsewhere along the border, the Communists turned loose another intense artillery and mortar barrage against American fortifications.

Army Captain Howard Levy has lost another bid for his release on bail - pending appeal of his conviction for making disloyal statements about America's conduct of the Vietnamese war. The US court of Military Appeals - in a unanimous opinion - ruled that bail is not available io a military prisoner. The thirty year old Captain is being held at the Fort Jackson, South Carolina, army hospital after being sentenced to hard labor for three years.

The Congolese radio says that loyal army troops have routed rebel forces in the two northeastern Congo cities of Kisangani and Bukavu. Halso, says that defeated white mercenary troops are being airlifted out of the battle zone to southern Rhodesia. Heavy fighting is also reported in the eastern town of Kindu. And here's a bulletin just in from Nigeria. The Lagos Radio reports that fighting has erupted between federal troops and rebel forces in the eastern region of Nigeria.

Mrs. Pellegreno - a thirty year old tousle-headed blonde who strongly resembles Miss Earhart made the global flight in twenty-eight days with a crew of three men. She had hoped the journey might shed some light on the mystery surrounding the disappearance of Earhart in her flight over the South Pacific in the summer of Nineteen Thirty-Seven.

To millions of Americans, Chief Big Tree
was just a face. Nobody knew his name, even though
his profile could be exchanged for candy bars and
jelly beans. And the fact that his face passed
through millions of hands each day didn't really
matter. But to hundreds of his followers, Big Tree
was a strong leader -- a man among men.

chief Big Tree - the profile known to all died yesterday on an Indian reservation in New York
State, at the age of one-hundred and two. Fiftyfour years ago he pased for artist James Fraser who
reproduced the Chief's profile on the famous Indian
head nickel. Big Tree went on to appear in more
than twenty movies -- among them "Drums Along The
Mohawk". And he was presented with the first Indian
Head coin ever to be minted in this country -- a
coin he carried to the end.

The federal government is seeking to reassure businessmen, farmers and workers that they'll suffer no "serious economic injury" because of the lower tariffs the United States agreed to recently in Geneva, Switzerland. But under-Secretary of Labor James Reynolds concedes that some firms and groups of workers may be adversely affected by an increase in imports arising tex from the tariff cuts. He says Congress will be asked to make it easier for such companies and workers to obtain federal help - if they've been hurt by the imports.

Police in Thailand are blaming the country's worst railroad tragedy on a bus driver who - so survivors claim - leaped to safety from the areadox overcrowded bus just before it rolled into the path of an on-coming express train. At least forty-three were killed and dozens more injured in the disaster which occurred about one hundred fifty miles northeast of Bangkok. This tragedy came on the heels of a similar one in East Germany -- where at least seventy-nine persons died in according a collision between a fuel truck and a train.

Seventeen-Oh-Seven -- a British Royal Navy Fleet under Sir Cloudsley Shovell, was returning to England when the ships ran into the rocks off the Scilly Isles of southwestern England, in a thick fog.
