

STRIKE

L.T.-Coods Mon, June 25-42,

The strike of the flight engineers union against Eastern Airlines - today brought a rebuke from an old friend of labor. Senator Morse of Oregon, denouncing the walkout as "irresponsible," ^{and} calling for - a quick settlement. ^{Morse} Threatening to introduce legislation - to deal with future labor-management disputes of this kind. In the words of the Oregon Democrat - "no union has a right to put a jurisdictional dispute above the welfare of the public."

As for the strike - it's still on. Eastern Airlines, grounded. Secretary Goldberg, once again, ^{stating} ~~in a~~ *that the talks are deadlocked* ~~marathon campaign - to work out an agreement~~

H.~~ Starley, approving - the motion. The selection of a jury - beginning in the Pecos court. The panel that will hear the case of the former boy wonder - who has been indicted for fraud. The former millionaire - who is teetering on the verge of bankruptcy.

While Estes ~~was~~ was facing prosecution in Texas - there were repercussions in Washington. An official of the Agriculture Department, Thomas Miller, admitting - that he okayed the Estes ~~in~~ cotton allotments. Did it against his better judgment - and at the direction of his superior in Washington. That superior - Emery Jacobs, who resigned after the Estes scandal broke.

In Houston, Senator Ralph Yarborough admits receiving thirty-seven phone calls from Estes. All of which,

the Senator terms - "routine". The kind of thing that every member of Congress - has to put up with. That familiar fact of life on Capitol Hill - being badgered by a constituent.

Two weeks ago, the explosion of a plastic bomb in Algiers - would hardly have been noticed. Plastiques - the favorite weapon of the O A S. Going off - every day.

Does this mean a return to the policy of terror - by the O A S? The French authorities are worried that it could be - since the terror has never left Oran. Today, a school in the ^{great} ~~western~~ seaport - ~~was~~ was bombed for the third time. Tonight, the buildings ^{is} - a heap of rubble.

~~The armistice in Algeria - precarious.~~ ^{not as precarious}

~~Later, the O A S destroyed~~ ^{also} a row of fuel tanks -
on the Oran waterfront. ~~Blowing up the~~ ^{These} tanks, touching off
a fire - that raced through ~~the~~ nearby buildings. An inferno
that forced ships at the dock - to lift Anchor, and ~~XXXXX~~ ^{move out}
into the harbor. Tonight, a column of black smoke - towers
over Oran. The people of the seaport, close to - mass panic, ^{and}
^{a mass} ~~Their~~ exodus to France, ^a gathering momentum.

Meanwhile, the former head of the O A S has been indicted - for a second time. Not double jeopardy - because the charge is different. Raol Salan was sentenced to life - on the ground that he led a rebellion against the State. Now he's accused of - connection with armed groups operating against the state. The two indictments, similar - but not identical. Hence ^{the French say} - no double jeopardy.
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The reason for all this, as you know - DeGaulle's anger at the previous verdict on Salan. The President of France demanding to know - why merely prison for the head of the O A S, when his adjutant was sentenced to death? The distinction suggested - that something was wrong with Salan's first ~~re~~ trial. ^{So there'll be} ~~That's why he's going to have~~ a second ^{with} ~~trial~~ ^{to} ~~will~~ a different court ^{to} pass judgment on - the man who admits that he was responsible for O A S terrorism in Algeria.

NEW GUINEA

In New Guinea, Dutch patrol bombers are out - over the grasslands north of Merauke; where Governor Rockefeller had his headquarters - when he was searching for his son Michael. Tonight, Merauke is the center of a theater of war.
