With a fond send-off from the President - First

Lady Pat Nixon today went winging South; first to Venezuela,
and then Brazil. A six day, nine thousand mile "good
neighbor" tour.

Mrs. Nixon's departure followed a brief ceremony at Homestead Air Force Base in Florida. The President calling his First Lady - the best Ambassador the U.S. has. Adding that Pat Nixon will be traveling "not only in an official capacity - but she will do something she has done in all her travels around the world - bring the best wishes of the American people to the peoples of all the countries she visits."

Next stop - Caracas - where Mrs. Nixon will attend tomorrow - the inauguration of Venezuela's President-elect, Carlos Andres Perez.

At Hillsboro, California - an anguished father answers his daughter's kidnappers. Newspaper publisher Randolph Hearst, the father of Patricia Hearst - pledging to do all he can to meet the kidnappers' latest ransom demands. Also, saying he would be "delighted" - to have two imprisoned members of the Symbionese liberation army appear on radio and TV. California officials have already said though - it can't be done.
