MARSHALL

Secretary of State Marshall today told leaders of Congress all about his plan to help Europe. First, memergency help, money for a stop-gap. He asks fivehundred-and-ninety-seven million dollars, immediately. Of this, three-hundred-and-twenty-eight million to go to France, forty-two million to Austria, and twohundred-and-twenty-seven million to Italy -- to tide those countries over until the end of March. This emergency help to be an outright gift, no question of repayment. Much of it to consist of food, masky fuel, fertilizer, seeds and medical supplies.

As for the long-term figures: Seven Billions, Five Hundred Millions, to be divided among sixteen nations of western Europe, during a fifteen-month period beginning April First. After four years, the Marshall Plan estimates the needs of Western Europe at from sixteen to twenty billions. This is considerably more than the figures of the Harriman Committee, which put aid at twelve to seventeen billion.

The Secretary of State set forth his pro

purpose as being to help the European nations support themselves as quickly as possible, and thereby help recovery throughout the world. His program, says General Warshall, is one of construction, production and recovery. He declares that it menaces nobody and seeks no special advantage -- pursuing no sinister purpose for the United States.

He paid his compliments to Russia, charging the Soviet Union with a deliberate plan to hamper the economic recovery of the western European nations.

The nations receiving our help will be asked to sign contracts to adopt money reforms so as to maintain stability in price and cost structures. They must also undertake to increase production, to increase their output of coal and basic food, also to cooperate in reducing barriers to trade and to promise increased interchange of goods and services. What's more, each country receiving aid must let its people know that

it comes from Uncle Sam. The reason for this being that the Soviet Union claimed the credit throughout the eastern countries for what we sent them -- and continues to claim that credit.

But, countries receiving money from Uncle Sam will not have to spend it over here. They are to buy, so far as possible, from other countries, everything that is scarce in the United States. This partly to px protect us against inflation over here.

An important feature of the program is that Uncle Sam will encourage private capital to take a prominent hand in the reconstruction of Europe.

Further details will be presented to Congress when the special session gets underway next Monday. Then President Truman, in person, will say more about the Plan.

Later, during the session there will be a supplementary proposal for aid to China. The Chinese and their government should be left to solve their own fundamental problems themselves, says General Marshall;

but, we should give them certain economic help to make their job easier.

In the text of his program, the Secretary of State used these words: "We must not permit the free community of Europe to be extinguished; for, should it occur, it would be a 11 tragedy for the world.We must not fail to meet this inspiring challenge," said he.

He frankly admits that he cannot guarantee the success of his plan, cannot promise that it will definitely stop the progress of Communism. The risks, he explains, are real, but they have been carefully calculated; and, he added: "I believe the chances of success are good."

The Friendship Train -- this good-will train collecting food for starving Europe -- rolled away from Ogden, Utah, today with three cars added. These cars loaded with Utah wheat and milk. The Friendship Train is now thirty-one carloads long, rolling out of the West to the Atlantic Coast where the food will be emptied into freighters to be carried to Europe's hungry countries. One of these two carloads of wheat loaded up in Ogden, Utah, was presented by the Church of the Latter Day Saints; the other bought with funds subscribed by the Utah Lions' Clubs.

At Green River, Wyoming, another four cars were added -- one of Wyoming condensed milk; three carloads of flour and sugar from Seattle; crackers and sugar from Portland; and wheat from Pendleton, Oregon.

It's good news that this Friendship Train is getting longer at each stop, heavy going for the two mighty engines of the Union Pacific Railroad that are pulling it East -- a heavy burden of good

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RESTITUTION

People who were robbed or swindled by the Mazis are going to have some chance of recovering their property. That is, those who suffered on a big scale. Uncle Sam's Military manne Government in Germany today announced measures for returning a considerable volume of Mazi loot to their rightful owners.

The Property Control Office of A.H.G. is now holding some nineteen thousand properties, whose values is guessed at about five billion, four hundred millions. The U.S. high co tried to persuade the German legislature in the American Zone to pass a law for the restoration of those properties, but the inguing legislature failed to do it. So the A.M.G. today promulgated the law on its own account. It provides that these properties shall be restored to all people who have lost them through transactions under duress or arising out of discrimination because of race, religion, nationality, ideology and political opposition to National Socialism. The A.M.G. Finance Chief calculates that somewhere between eighty and ninety per cent of the rightful owners are Jews.

on the subject of Palestine. A real surprise from Lake Success, The differences between Uncle Sam and the Soviet Union are being ironed out. After weeks of negotiating, the two major powers are reaching a workable compromise. This cansummation hove in sight today, when the Soviet Union submitted a plan which promises a procedure whereby we can agree on all points. It promises, moreover, a decision on the future of the Holy Land by the United Mations before the end of the present session of the General Assembly.

For one thing, Russia agrees that the British shall hold onto their mandate until May Pirst, thereby splitting the difference with the U.S.A. Next comes the proposal that the partition of Palestine shall be put into effect by the first of July, on which day the new Arab and Jewish States become independent. That will leave a transition period from May First until July First.

Most important of all is a compromise clause on the

Unless something is done, added the Prime Minister, the Lords can prevent the Labor Government from nationalizing the iron and steel industries and putting into effect the rest of its Socialization program.

A young American woman walked onto New York soil today from the gangplank of a liner, free after two-and-a-half years as a slave laborer in Russia. What she told newspapermen was a wivid addition to what we've heard about the horrors

Irma Mohaupt was born in Cincinnati, of Hungarian parents. When she was six years old her father took her to Jugoslavia. There she lived through the Nazi occupation more or less unharmed. But five days before Christmas Nineteen Forty-four, the Russians entered the village. They took all the girls off to work, refused to tell their parents where they were going. Irma was in a gang taken first to the Ukraine, then to Moscow. They were set to carrying bricks and and cements and driving trucks; working, as she put it, "like horses to rebuild the cities the Germans had wrecked." And, said this American girl, "We didn't complain because there was no one to listen."

Their food consisted mostly of thin soup. They worked

all day, didn't care much what they ate or where they slept. She saw old men and women waste away to skin and bones in the labor camps, then fall and die.

A cousin of hers heard through the underground what had happened to Irma, and applied to the State Department. So She was taken to the Russian Zone of Germany and then released, released with no money, her clothes in rags.

TRUMAN

Today, President Truman issued a Proclamation designating Thursday, November Twenty-Seventh, as Thanksgiving Day. In bis Proclamation, the President of the United States calls on the people of America of every faith to consecrate November Twenty-Seventh for thoughts of gratitude, acts of devotion, and a firm resolve to assist in the efforts being made to aid the undernourished, the sick, the aged, and all sufferers in yar devastated lands.

"May our Thanksgiving this year be tempered by humility, by sympathy, and by compassion for those who lack abundance," says the President. "May we remember that it is more blessed to give than to receive; and may we manifest our remembrance of that precept by generously sharing our bounty with needy people of other nations." HUGHES

President Truman announced today that Greece was saved from economic collapse and remains free, thanks to help from Uncle Sam. But, added Mr. Truman, the situation still is grave, because the Communists are keeping up their guerrilla warfare.

Although economic collapse has been averted, the economic situation in Greece has not improved basically. So far the work of the American mission has been largely one of preparation.
