Twelfth. The word from London is that replies should

begin to come in tomorrow, others next week -- with

nations answering whether or not they want to

participate in a concerted program for American help

combined with European self help.

Well, the replies were expected to begin temorrow, but here's one already, this evening. A dispatch from Rome reads as follows: "Italy tonight officially accepted the British-French invitation to attend the Marshall Plan Conference in Paris." Research 30 mins. After research 30 mins. From Holland, this dispatch "A spokesman for the Dutch Foreign Ministry said today the Netherlands government would accept the angle angle french invitation to take part in the Paris

Similarly, from Dublin, a report saying

that Ireland will accept quickly. Here's word from Denmark -- the more interesting as it had been supposed that the Scandinavian countries might hesitate, because of their fear of Soviet Russia. Sweden and Norway in particular, might be expected to think twice before angering the Soviets. But there's no hesitation in Denmark. The Danish Prime Minister indicates that his country will accept. But what about the governments under Soviet Domination? That's a key question: -- will the satellite states dare to show any signs of cooperating with the western democracies for the economic recovery of Europe? No doubt they'd like to, -- tempted plenty mb by the attractions of that good old American bounty, aid from Uncle Sam. But will they dare? Here's a dispatch from Prague, Czechoslovakia. It reads: "Usually well informed sources said tonight that Czechoslovakia would accept the Anglo-French invitation to the Marshall plan conference. "

And something from Poland - - at least from the Polish Premier, who is visiting in Prague. He told a news conference today that, in spite of the Soviet boycott of the American aid program, Poland still maintains what he calls -- "a positive interest" in it.

These may be signs that Soviet satellites, some of them at least, may accept the invitation delivered to them today -- which certainly would not tend to tie them any closer to their Moscow masters. But probably it is too much to hope that the puppets will venture any defiance of Soviet Russia.

Still later news from London, Portugal has accepted the invitation.

And Oslo: the Norwegians say they will probably take part. And that takes courage -- a quality the Norwegians have plenty of.

The first rejection? From Finland. Says a spokesman in Helsinki: "there is no possibility of Finland joining the conference." And he added:"Official Finnish policy is one of friendship to the Soviet Union." And that's understandable.

TRUMAN FOLLOW MARSHALL PLAN

Our American answer to the Soviet rejection of the Marshall plan was given in an appropriate setting today -- on the portico of a stately colonial mansion in Virginia, the home of Thomas Jefferson. The answer was made by President Truman in a Fourth of July address at the old southern plantation of the author of the Declaration of Independence.

The President concentrated on the big argument that Molotov put forward- the Soviet talk **** about national sovereignty, that ***, if the nations of Europe should get together for concerted action to help Americas help them, their sovereignty would be hurt. We thought that this kind of narrow nationalies was of sinking nations that went to be easier.

President Truman today put that thought in the following words: "Surely, after two world wars", said he, "nations should have learned the folly of a nationalism so extreme as to block cooperative economic planning for peaceful reconstruction"

emphasis on the sacredness of national sovereignty is mostly a twist of sophistry to disguise the real Soviet objection to the Marshall plan -- which calls for a kind of economic cooperation that might weaken the Soviet hold on its puppet nations, something getting in behind the iron curtain.

made in London today -- a British government spokesman reminding the Soviets that any attempt to intimidate the puppet countries and keep them from joining in the Marshall plan -- why, that would be a violation of their sovereignty. If the Soviets are keen about national rights, they will surely be most careful about respecting the national rights of the Soviet satellites -- the sovereignty of the puppets.

President Truman today, at the kauxhome of Thomas Jefferson, went on with words that would have pleased the ears of Jefferson himself. "So long" declared the President, "as the basic right of men

are denied in any substantial portion of the earth, men everywhere must live in fear of their own rights and security."

Well, what are those rights? Thomas Jefferson ra gave us the answer one-hundred-and-seventyone years ago, in the Declaration of Independence. Let's take a took at the second paragraph -- phrases that have been repeated over and over, and can be repeated once again, with a maximum of meaning markin on this present Fourth of July. I wonder how those words, familiar to us from childhood, wax would sound to the despots of the Kremlin and the enslaved masses of the Russian people? Suppose they were to hear the beginning of that second paragraph; the para that needs: - "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain Analienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

ITALY FOLLOW TRUMAN

We noted previously that Italy today
was the first country to announce formal acceptance
of the invitation to the Marshall Plan. Well, the
Italians have solid reason for valuing American help.
Today in Rome and agreement was signed turning over
to Italy one-hundred-and-twenty-five million dollars
worth of supplies left over from U N R R A.

Moreover, we transferring twenty-eight liberty ships to Italy; and, there's a hundred and million dollar loan already approved. In addition to which, we are negotiating treaties of an friendship, commerce, navigation and aviation with the non-communist government at Rome.

Meanwhile, a spokesman for the northern mine owners including the United States STeel corporation, hailed the agreement with Lewis as opening the way to steel production on a full scale, which will bring down the exorbitant price of steel.

The All-American angle of sports in Britain continued today, at Wimbledon three of the five tennis events were sure to go into all-American finals. The other two probably.

Previously, in the game of golf, the
British Amateur Champion-ships in Scotland produced an
all-American final, Willie Turnesa winning. Then
Mrs. Didrickson Zaharias, the mighty Babe, ran away
with the British women's golf championship. And now,
tennis.

Del, Over at Wimbledon, the Fourth of July been began today with two American women, Margaret Osborne of San Francisco and Doris Hart of Miami, scheduled to battle it out for the women's singles championship. The men's singles, too, had become all-American -- Jack Kramer of Los Angeles and Tom Brown of San Francisco having eliminated all other contestants.

Then, this morning, the women's doubles became all-American when two pairs of our gal tennis players beat the last of British opposition, and won

their way into the finals. In addition, it looks as if the men's doubles and the mixed doubles would go the same way -- all five of the Wimbledon events producing all-American finals.

This afternoon, in the mens singles, Jack

Dramer won an easy victory, star of our Davis Cup Team,

out-classed Tom Brown, of the University of California,

and became the first of this year's Wimbledon champions.

And then the news from the Henley regatta
where John B. Kelly of the University of Pennsylvania
scored a victory over the British champion, Bertram
Bushell, by four boat lengths -- without extending
himself. The finals, tomorrow, with a Norwegian.

And, at the Henley regatta, the eight-man-crew championships look like another of those All-American finals. Today a crew from the Keny School in Connecticut won its race xx from a British crew, as did eight husky rowers from Tabor Academy in Marion, Massachusetts; putling both Kent and Tabor in the semi-finals. If each wins again, the two American crews will row it out for
