For President Nixon - a thunderous welcome today in Louisville; with a crowd of more than seven thousand turning out at Louisville airport; greeting the President's arrival - with a roar of approval. The President in turn, pledging to work, for the kind of peace - all Americans want. And he said I assure you we're going to get it. Adding that he's also "working for a better life - under which we can have high employment and cut down on the cost of living." The President noted further that his trip to Kentucky - was, "of course, a non-political visit." Smiling broadly though he observed: "Every time I've been on the ticket - Kentucky has come through."

Another fifty thousand or so Louisvillers - cheering the President's motorcade as he drove on into the city to confer at a closed session of the thirteen governors who comprise the Appalachian Regional Commission.

VIENNA

At Vienna - another session of those twice-weekly Strategic Arms Limitation Talks today; followed by an agreement between U.S. and Russian negotiators - to take a week off for "stock-taking." A U.S. spokesman saying: "We want to take a look at where we are." This leading to speculation that the initial phase of the SALT talks - may be nearing a successful conclusion; in which case the parley would revert back to Helsinki - where the hard bargaining

is expected to begin.

INDO CHINA

Ground action in Southeast Asia - marked by successful communist **to** strikes in each of the three battle **ground** nations. The first of these - in Laos; where enemy forces or captured the Mekong river town of Moula Pamok -- thereby shoring up a main infiltration route.

The second in Cambodia; where Communist troops struck at the town of Sraka Neak -- attempting to cut Phom Penh's life line to the sea. And the third in South Vietnam; where the Viet Cong hit a U S outpost near Hue - billing six of their own dead.

Be that as it may - the US command in Saigon today announcing the planned deactivation of two airforce squadrons. The first step in "phase four" of the current US withdraual plan.

Asserting that "a tragedy of major proportions" did take place; also, charging army and State Department officers with a "concerted" effort to cover up the situation. The latest from that non-war in the middle East -- tells today of another Arab-guerrilla raid across the Suez Canal; followed by a fifty-fourth straight day of Israeli air strikes -- against military targets in back in Egypt.

Lieutenant General Leslie R. Groves, a man who left an indelible stamp on the US military establishment. As the Chief of all army construction back in Nineteen Forty One - the driving force behind the construction of the Pentagon. The following year heading up the Manhattan Project, which was soon to produce the world's first atomic bomb. A government citation later praising his leadership - in solving a problem of "staggering complexities", adding that General Groves helped to defeat "the axis powers - in the race to produce an instrument whose more peace time potentialities are **momented** no less marvelous than its war-time application is awesome.

The biggest of these - in Paris -- including a military parade; where the French displayed for the first time - their medium range nuclear missiles. The French Foreign Legion - whick was banned by DeGaulle for its role in Algeria - also making a re-appearance.
