The nation's second big steel maker - Bethlehem Steel - today raised its prices in defiance of the President's anti-inflation campaign. A spokesman saying its new prices - will be "in line" with those recently announced by its competition - meaning U S Steel which is still attempting to justify its own action. Indeed, the latter today cutting back its announced price hikes, by about-twenty-percent. But the next move seems to be up to the President's wage and price stability council.

Former President Nixon last week paid more

In the Watergate ever-up trial - another day of closing arguments; including a surprise suggestion from Defense Councel William Hundley - that it may have been Charles Colson who actually okayed the Watergate bus bugging. Hundley's accusation based in part on a taped statement from Richard Nixon - who said that, "Colson may dama well have been the trigger man."

The US Supreme Court today issued a flurry of rulings - in its final decision day for the year.

These including a six to three verdict - upholding the President's right to grant pardons and impose individual conditions; and to do so - almost any way he sees fit.

The court observing that the President's

pardoning power comes directly from the Constitution.

Adding: "The very essence of the pardoning power

is to treat each diversure acris a case individually."
