The present boom of prosperity in this country was disclosed in the form of figures today - figures showing that the average weekly earnings of Americans are now at an all-time high. This emanates from the Labor Department, which discloses that wages in manufacturing rose in May to a record average of forty-eight-dollars-and-eighty-six cents a week. The previous peak was established during the war - forty-seven-dollars-and-a-half a week. That was for a wartime forty-five hour week, while the still higher figure right now is for a week that averages forty-and four-toths hours.

At the same time, unemployment has tied the r previous low record. Right now there are less than two million unemployed, matching a similar low figure for last Fall.

Furthermore, housing construction is booming to a new peak, the prediction being that Mineteen Forty-Seven will show a figure of twelve billion dollars invested in the construction of new buildings.

All of which is the technical background for a Labor Department report that this nation's economic position is now on what the report calls "A high level, a plateau, with plenty of strength." ***

With no sign of a clump in the making, the Labor Department for the following words:

"There is nothing in the current picture to indicate any general downtrend or recession."

It would appear that the White House has never been under such heavy pressure - floods of mail and telegrams urging the President to veto that Labor Bill to which the Unions are so bitterly opposed. The Treasury Department has given Congress an income-splitting plan to allow husbands and wives to divide up the total family income for purposes of taxation according to the scheme, a husband and a wife could each report half of their total income, even though the husband earned it all - which, of course, would mean a considerable saving.

privilege which, according to the present plan, would be extended to all income taxpayers who might want to split income between husband and wife in reporting for taxation.

Great Britain and France have issued an appeal to Soviet Russia: - please come in and join the Marshall Plan! It was announced in Paris tonight that British Foreign Secretary Bevin and French Foreign Minister Bidault have dispatched a note to Moscow, urging the Soviets to participate in the program proposed by the American Secretary of State - the European nations to get together in a concerted effort to do what they can for themselves, and the United States to fill in with whatever Europe is unable to provide.

There's not much optimism in Paris about a Soviet reply, the key to the matter being the fact that today French Communist papers continued their bitter attacks on the Marshall Plan. Therefore all their Communist catch-phrases to condemn the American scheme to help in economic reorganization of Europe. It is taken for granted that French Red Journalism is getting its orders from Moscow - is following the party line as dictated by the Stalin Regime.

The latest is a sudden denial of the official announcement of this agreement. A denial issued by a spokesman of the French Foreign Office. This is a diplomatic sensation in Paris tonight, But it is not being taken too seriously in the face of the official statement earlier in the day. The belief is that the British and French do not want to flaunt their agreement in the face of Soviet Russia - that they don't want to seem to present the Soviets with an accomplished fact, in which Moscow & had no part. It is taken for granted that the official announcement was correct - and that Britain and France have agreed on an organization for taking advantage of the America offer.

In the all-Jewish City of Tel Aviv today, there was a violent explosion - with all sorts of melodramatic angles. The black was in the basement of a building only sixty yards from Pritish Security Headquarters one of the most heavily guarded buildings in alestine. The British police say there as a plot that almost caused the greatest disaster in the recent violent history of the the Holy land. Why did the plot fail? What happened? That's one of the strangest parts of the story.

British authorities declare that in the basement of the apartment house was a hidden armament factory, where terrorists of the Jewish Underground, Irgun Zvai Leumi, made weapons and explosives. At the same time, the apartment house basement was the starting for an attempt to blow up the British Security Headquarters - only sixty yards away. From the basement a tunnel had been dug in the direction of the Security Building, and had only a few yards to go. The supposition is that the Terrorists intended to pack explosives under the Security

Headquarters and blow it up. Instead, the basement blow the Tewrol Underground plant, blew up today, with a violent blast. One man was killed. When the police investigated the wreckage in the basement, they found the body of a Zionist believed to have been a member of the Irgun Zvai Leumi.

But they also found something else. In the wreckage the police picked up a note written in Hebrew, a note saying: "Haganah has jix just been here." Haganah, of course, is the main Jewish Underground Army, moderate in policy, the Armed Force directed by the Jewish Agency. Haganah is opposed to the doings of the Terrorists and has issued a stern warning - no violence while the Commission of the United Nations is in Palestine. That Commission, investingating the problem of the Holy Land, has been holding hearings in Jerusalem - and today is making an inspection tour.

The note found in the wreckage of the base basement is believed to indicate that Haganah was making good its warning - no terrorism while the U.N. commission is conducting its investigation. Supposedly the

moderate forces of the Jewish Underground knew about the plot to blow up the British Security Headquarters at Tel Aviv, and took action to forestall it - by blowing up the basement from which the attempt was being made. That is believed to have been the meaning of the note in Hebrew found in the wreckage - Haganah has just been here!

Later news from Tel Aviv: - Hagana admits its part in today's explosion. Moreover, Hagana says that the dead man found in the wrecked basement was not not a member of Irgun Zvai Leumi. Instead man a member of Hagana's Army. In fact he was the one who detonated the mine that was to have blown up British headquarters in Tel Aviv. His name: Zeev Werber; just twenty years old.

Hagana tonight is appealing to the public of Tel Aviv tam to attend Werber's funeral, describing him as "an officer killed in action while saving Tel Aviv".
