Stassen will seek the Mepublican nomination in mineteen-Stassen will seek the Mepublican nomination in mineteenfifty-two. A leader for the former Minnesota Governor States: "Stassen will be in the political picture in the campaign for the next Mepublican nomination."

Seems a bit early, but not altogether unexpected. Stassen made a whirlwind campaign for the <u>mineteen</u> <u>forty nomination and he is still young</u>. Governor Dewey, after two tries, declares that he is out of the Presidential picture. So now the man from Minnesota is already announced as the race for 1952.

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### ELECTION BET

There are millions of people in this country who have been saying -- "If I'd only put a bet on Truman." So now among them we have a headliner --Mrs. India Edwards, Director of the Women's Division of the Democratic national party.

Today she explained to newsmen that she wanted to bet a thousand dollars on the President, at fifteen to one which would have brought her fifteen thousand dollars. Why didn't she do it? Because her husband knew better.

"I feel terribly" she said today. "My husband thought loyalty and confidence were fine, but you don't have to be idiotic about it. So," she added adly "we still have the mortgage on our farm."

Which is the classic of not betting on Truman -- hubby persuading the Director of the Women's Division of the Democratic National Committee that she would only lose her money.

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### POLITICS

At Key west the democratic leaders are rallying around the Fresident, whose vacation seems to be a fairly busy one. In the Key west High Council, there is one big question -- what to do about the Dixiecrats? They are trying to figure out what kind of welcome to give the Southern Democrats who were against Fresident Truman in the election.

The news today told of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt coming out for drastic reprisals against the Dixiecpat. The anti-Truman rebels retain their place in Corgress, and a powerful plage it is -- especially as they are entitled to Chairmanships of important committees. The widow of the Late Franklin D. Roosevelt demands that the Dixiecrats in Congress be deprived of these influential posts -- on the ground that they are Democrate no longer. She mentions Congressman Rankin of Mississippi who supported the Dixiecrat ticket, Thurmond and wright. She also called for action against Senator Olin Johnson of South Carolina -- who was bitterly Anti-Tryman at first, but supported the fresident after he

was nominated.

The word in Washington tonight is that these Congressional reprisals, proposed by Mrs. Roosevelt, will not be made -- that the party and administration will not intervene in the Congressional business of naming Committee Chairman. That comes from Democratic National Chairman, Senator McGrath, who says that (punishment will be confined to the top Dixiecrat leaders. They will be deprived of positions in the regular organization of the Democratic Party.)

In particular, there is J. Strom Thurmond, Governor of South Carolina, who ran for President on the Anti-Truman ticket. He will not be recognized as Democratic National Committeeman from South Carolina. Support will be given to Southerners who supported the President, a spokesman of the Democratic National Committee stating that the aim is to establish, what he calls -- "A loyal functioning, pro-Truman Party-organization in every Southern State."

Prominent among the Southerners who supported the

Truman cause is "overnor Folsom of Alabama -- although his own state thre the 'resident off the ballot. So what now about Governor Folsom, known far and wide as --"Kissin' Jim"?

He comes up with a bright idea, as he is always likely to do. He suggests that he would be available for -- that Mission to Hoscow. Which would be a revival, indeed, of Fresident Truman's plan to send a personal emissary to the Aremlin to have a talk with Stalin. The Fresident thought the right kind of envoy would be Chief Justice Vinson, but now Kissing Jim offers himself, for what he calls -- "A crackerbarrel-Mission-to-Moscow."

But what would he and Stalin do with a cracker barrel? The Alabama Statesman reverts back to good old American ways, farmers talking politics in a rural general store. He explains it in these words: "I've always believed that, if 4 could get across a cracker barrel from Joe Stalin, we could talk peace."

So maybe that's the answer to the Berlin Crisis, Send Kissin' Jim to the Kremlin with a cracker barrel.

### FOLLOW POLITICS

Something more serious along these lines is a late story from the temporary white House at Key West - a denial that President Truman may see Stalin. The report was printed in the Washington Times-Herald, which told of a plan for the President to have a talk with the Soviet Premier either in Moscow or in Washington - some time before the new Congress convenes in January. The answer, given by the White House Press Secretary, is in the following words: "There is no such plan in mind."

The Washington newspaper report was passed along tonight by the Soviet news agency Tass, which made no comment. And this Ameridan rumor has drifted across the ocean to Rome, where it is the subject of remarks tonight by the official newspaper of the Vatican. The reception -- one of approval. "Perhaps" declares the Vatican paper, the rumor of a Truman-Stalin meeting in the near future is. not pure fantasy." 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### U.N. FOLLOW POLITICS

In the Berlin "risis, a new attempt for a compromise was begun today by the Secretary of the United Mations, Trygve Lie. He has initiated conferences with the Western and Soviet representatives, also with delegations of the smaller nations. Frevious attmepts have failed, but now -- another neutral quest for a middle-of-theroad solution. TIn the political committee of the U. N., something that sounds as "merican as Folsom's cracker barrel -- a filibuster. Today the Committee voted a restriction of debate -- to end a marathon of talk headed by the delegation from Jugoslavia. The committee is preparing to act on a resolution condemning the puppet states of Jugoslavia, Bulgaria, and Albania for giving aid to the Hed Guerrillas in Greece. Trying to stop the vote, the Jugoslav delegate addressed the committee twenty-seven times in two sessions.

Today American Delegate John roster Dulles proposed measures to break the filibuster, and a restriction was passed, a gag rule -- limiting all speeches to ten minutes.

### ANTI-COMMUNIST RADIO

A mysterious underground radio is found to be operating in Europe -- with anti-communist broadcasts against the Red Regime in Czechoslovakia. United States Government monitors have picked up messages from t-. The advance the suggestion that a new republic may be formed within the boviet Satellite -- a free Slovak Republic.

American radio officials are not inclined to believe the clandestine station is operated inside Czechoslovakia -- where it could be detected easily by the Meds. So the secret broadcasts must emanate What are true from some other place. They feature true pictures and the facts about the world this side of the Tron curtain.

The concealed station also sends code messages -communications meant for the Czechoslovak underground. For example, American monitors picked up the following mystifying jargon: "We are calling Orion," said the secret radio. "Thanks for the message received an hour ago. We are in a festive mood. Is at least one candle left? Greetings to the Porter. East will probably

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### SUBSTITUTE LEAD PALESTINE

(The latest from Palestine pictures a new flare-up of war in the southern desert, the Negeb. Troops of Israel today captured a fortress held by Egyptians. Tel-Aviv states that the Egyptian garriso was under seige -- during these days of truce. Today they tried to steal past the Jewish positions -whereupan artillery opened fire on the beseiged town. The Egyptians yielded and surrendered.

**the M.** Another proposal to guard the truce in Palestine, made officially today by the U M mediator, Dr. Ralph Bunche -- the idea being to establish a no man's land between "ewish and Arab forces.) The mediator submitted his proposal to a closed Council meeting in Paris, and immediate objection was made by Israel. "We categorically oppose any plan which calls for demilitarized zones, or a no man's land, in our Land," declared the spokesman for "srael.

The government at Tel Aviv, meanwhile, has asked the U. M. truce "fficials to investigate reports that British troops have entered Palestine. Israel says that word has been received of Pritish Contingents arriving in Trans-Jordan recently, and that some of them are in Palestine. So an investigation is requested -- as the London Government denies the report, and insists that no British soldiers are in the Holy Land.

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### EGYPT

Egypt is in a state of emergency tonight -after an attempt to kill the leader of the Extreme Mationalist Farty, the WAFD. We is Ex-Premier Mustapha El Mahas Pasha, and the would be assassins were certainly out to get him -- with bombs and machine guns.

This afternoon, the "ationalist leader was in his home, when a bomb, planted just outside of the house, went off -- and the reverberation shook Cairo. Mustapha El Mahas Fasha, and his family, escaped injury. Whereupon the Ex-Fremier went to a meeting of his Nationalist Party.

There he attended the proceedings -- and, as he left for home, another attempt was made on his life. A bomb was hurled at his car. Again he was uninjured by the explosion.

He drove to his home, and there his enemies opened fire with a machine gun. A guard of police blaged away in return, -- and, in the exchange of gunshots, four policemen were hit, one seriously injured. But, in the hail of bullets, Mustapha El

Nahas 'asha escaped again. A friend pushed him behind a stone wall, machine gun slugs whizzing right by him.

The stubborn and repeated assassination attempts created huge excitement in Cairo, where the government immediately clamped on emergency laws to guard against an outbreak. The identity of the bomb and machine gun terrorists is not known, but the Nationalist Party is having a feud in its ranks, with bitter emmity among the leaders.

Not including today's events, there have been five previous attempts to assassinate Mustapha El Nahas Pasha--with pistols, machine guns, hand grenades, and dynamite. But he has escaped them all, quoted as saying: "Allah is on my side. wobody can injure me." Well, today -- Allah certainly was merciful. CHINA

(The Chinese nightmare grows worse -- with wild inflation riots today. The new and supposedly stabilized currency issued by the Chiang Kai-Shek Government has gone the way of the older Chinese money, which vanished in a fantasy of inflation. Already the new gold yuan has plunged to a fraction of its value, and today merchants were refusing to accept i as payment for goods.) Workers rejected paper money as wages, and demanded food instead.

Disorders flared in Shanghai, where hungry mobs plundered rice shops and looted vegetable stands. A u. S. Army Officer, with long service in China, said: "This is the worst I have ever seen. These people are angry. They are just right for the Communists."

At the same time, the Communists are moving down from the North. Having swept into control of Manchuria, they today drove past the Great Wall of China -- into xx the Northern Provinces.

So now unhappy China faces a twofold nightmare, financial and Communist -- inflation and invasion. URANIUM

They whaving a branium rush in Canada -- this time near the Great Lakes. Previous headline strikes of the radioactive metal were made far up in the northern wilderness. But now the rush is on seventy three miles from Sault Ste. Marie & Northeastern Shore of Lake Superior.

laid bare a two inch seam of pitchblende. That's the original mineral which figured in the first discovery of radioactivity. Nobert Campbell kept the secret to himself, and is said to have staked thirty claims of his own, before anybody else knew about his discovery of Uranium -- the radioactive metal for the Atomic Bomb.

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### CALIFORNIA FIRE

The Marines went into action on the California fire front today - the Leathernecks launching a drive against the raging brush fire, southern California's worst of the year. The flames got out of control yesterday, whipped by a sixty mile an hour wind. Today, the fire was **hrem** bearing down on the town of Silverado when daredevil Marines charged in with bulldozers. They cut a fire trail to check the advancing blaze, and jammed the bulldozers through almost in the face of the tempest of flame.

# ENDURANCE FLYERS

The endurance flyers at Longview, Texas, are still in the air, completing their third week. We heard on October Twentieth how Fred Winmont and Bert Simmons, of Dallas, took off, and were circling Longview flying field, determined to break the endurance record. Picking up fuel and food, snatching packages **free** from the ground, they have been going round and round ever since. They completed their twenty-first day today, and plan to make the sixty-two-days - coming down about Christmas.

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SHRIMPS\_

Shrimps on a California ranch. & hundred miles from the sea, they get fresh shrimp daily -in their own back yard. The catch comes from the bottom of a well; fresh water-although the shrimp is a saltwater crustacran. The astronomers announce that just before dawn a bright wanderer of the sky will be visible all the way across the Southern Belt, from Florida **uni-Georgia** to Southern California. First observed in South Africa on Saturday last, the new heavenly body is said to be brighter than Halley's Comet, the most famous of all.
