SAN CLEMENTE

The Western White House - San Clemente - a giant step today toward the solution of one of America's most pressing problems - unemployment. President Nixon signing into law - a new two billion dollar measure aimed at creating more than a hundred and fifty thousand jobs - over the next two years.

The President - who vetoed an earlier public works bill saying he was definitely set against "a dead-end entrapment in permanent public subsidy." But he added that "a very important feature" of this new act - "is that the jobs will be transitional;" which means - said he - "they will lead people into permanent jobs and not be a substitute for them." With first preference to go to returning G I 's.

A summer-long suspension of the draft - became a distinct possibility today. With House and Senate conferees-again failing to reach an agreement; thereby leaving in limbo - a scheduled two year extension of the present selective service act.

Chief stumbling block - the same as before. The Senate insisting on a clause - calling for total withdrawal from Vietnam within nine months, subject to the release of all American prisoners. The House - refusing to go along on this.

In any event, the conferees are now scheduled to hold their next session - July Twentieth, a week from tomorrow, and then face a deadline of August Sixth - when the Congress is set to begin a month-long summer recess.
