From Saigon came an announcement today that the

Viet Cong plan to release their last thirty-two PO W's

this Saturday; a day earlier than previously announced; and,

four days ahead of the official deadline.

Saigon sources adding that the North Vietnamese may also release their remaining one-hundred-and-six
prisoners at the same time. This would leave only seven
military and two civilian U.S. prisoners - still in enemy
hands. These in Laos.

Meanwhile, the men who have already returned - were beginning to tell their stories; bit by bit - revealing hardships they endured. At Wright Patterson Air Force Base Major William Baugh saying: "We often wondered whether we had died and gone to hell." At San Antonio, Texas, Sergeant John Anderson saying: "Initially it's pretty much a state of shock - then you begin to roll with the punches."

Asked if he meant literal punches - he declined to answer.
