FORD

President Ford will hold a news conference Monday night at seven thirty eastern time - presumably to discuss the new and tentative agreement with Russia to limit nuclear weapons. Reports from Moscow say the proposed pact has already won the approval of the Politburo - the Soviet ruling body.

From Peking, and the White House we hear President

Ford will visit China - late next year. The Chinese

expressed hope for such a visit to Secretary Kissinger when

he arrived in Peking last Monday.

Today Dr. Kissinger flew to Tokyo for a brief visit. He returns to Washington tomorrow.

The U.N. Security Council has voted approval for a six month extension of the U N peace keeping force now on the Golan Heights - the buffer zone between the Syrian and the Israeli armies.

Israelis patrolling inside Lebanon are reported to have intercepted and killed five Palestinian guerrillas to about cross over and launch new attacks against Israeli settlements.

Judge Sirica's three man medical team delivered its opinion today - that former President Richard Nixon is too ill to testify in the current Watergate trial, and is likely to remain so until early next year at best. This makes it doubtful that his testimony will figure in the trial which is now expected to end by Christmas.
