But The Governor of Pennsylvania is thinking about -more than the nomination. He thinks that if he's the Republican nominee - he'll defeat Lyndon Johnson in November.

How much chance -- does Scranton have? Mathematically
-- he's far behind. According to United Press International -he has seventy-one delegates pledged to him on the first ballot.
Goldwater, five hundred and thirty-two. With six hundred and
fiftive-five -- needed to win.

But Scranton is already picking up -- some additional delegates from among -- those committed to Cabot Lodge. Maxwell Rabb, head of the Lodge movement -- advising his people to switch to Scranton. Should most of them do so -- the Pennsylvania Governor would have over one hundred delegates -- plus momentum that might attract more.

But enough -- to put him over the top in San Francisco? We'll have to wait for that answer -- wait until next month.

## KHRUSHCHEV

Whenever Nikita Khrushchev departs from a prepared speech to make some remarks on the side - you can be virtually sure of his subject. Namely - Red China. His feud - with Mao Tse Tung.
