GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Today's political drama centered in Chicago -- the Windy City, into which Goldwater and Scranton breezed for that "audition" with the Illinois delegation. Barry Goldwater, smiling and confident -- went in first. To continue wooing those fifty-eight delegates most of them already lined up for him. The Senator again saying he will be nominated -- and elected.

Governor Scranton arriving later -- for the private meeting, telling a street corner crowd outside that Republicans should vote -- as Abraham Lincoln would -- if he were a delegate -- at San Francisco.

There was a report that the delegates would be polled, asked to state their commitment -- Scranton or Goldwater. It was held, and as expected, Barry Goldwater

kept most of his strength, in the Illinois delegation. So announced by Senator Dirksen in his news conference -- after the poll. Forty-eight delegates standing by the Arizonan. Scranton the others, not certain.

ST. AUGUSTINE

For the second day in a row, about fifty integrationists disported themselves in the previously segregated surf - of Saint Augustine, Florida. About a hundred police officers again making a circle round the swimmers - to prevent violence. Things so quiet on the beach - that even children were playing there, Aight next to - the police line. And Martin Luther King is expressing "cautious optimism" - about the progress made toward settling the racial troubles in Saint Augustine.

Disaster struck that twin-hulled oil exploration vessel in the Gulf of Mexico - when it bored into a natural gas pocket. Instead of ap into the oil it was looking for - on the bottom of the Gulf.

The huge rig exploded, burned and sanh within fifteen minutes - just before dawn. Continuing to burn - even under water. The sea - blazing with fuel oil from the ship's tanks. Which have a capacity of - fifteen thousand gallons. Hours after the accident, we are told, the sea was still boiling and steaming - around the sunken vessel.

Twenty-three known to have survived - of the crew of forty-three. Some of them - badly burned.

Typhoon Winnie with winds of one hundred and eighteen miles an hour - leaves a trail of devastation tonight. Right across - the Northern Philippines. The fatal lady - storming out of the southwest Pacific. Blasting Manila, the capital city of nearly two and a half million people - with all the fearsome power behind her rage. Reed Houses, concrete walls, roofs, trees, electronic wires - all how knocked down or ripped apart by the typhoon. The storm name rampaging all night long - through the city streets. Mooding - whole neighborhoods; Causing damage in the millions. Disrupting communications. Thousands of families reported homeless. Many dead and injured.

Typhoon Winnie now headed otratght for - Red China; Her winds - undiminished.

The weather picture takes us from the Philippines -back to New York where it was a record ninety-nine degrees
today, to Argentina, where it was still ten below, which it has
been for nearly four weeks now. The worst cold wave in fifteen
years -- in Argentina. Cold air from the Antarctic -- gripping
the country of the pampas and the gauchos. Ruining vineyards
and orchars. With no let up in sight. Nore frigid Antarctic
weather on its way north -- from the South Pole.

The Distinguished Service Cross goes to jet pilot Charlie Klusmann of San Diego - because he <u>let</u> himself be accaptured by Laotian guerrillas.

Here's the story. Klussman was on a reconnaissance mission last month - when Red anti-aircraft fire hit his plane. Pha pilot - forced to bail out. Landing safely - in the jungle.

Another pilot - saw him go down. And radioed his position - back to the Air base. Whereupon a rescue helicopter - flew out to pich him up. But, the area was alive - with Reds. And Klussmann waved the whirlybird off - rather than take a chance on the crew being shot or captured. He waved it off - knowing full well that he would himself become a prisoner of the Laotian guerrillas. Which happened - a few minutes later.

Charlie Klussman - still a captive out there in Southeast Asia. His wife, accepting his Distinguished Service Cross for him - at the Pentagon.
