SAN CLEMENTE

The Western White House - again President Nixon today vetoed a measure aimed at cutting off funds for U.S. bombing in Cambodia. The President charging that such a cut-off -would "cripple or destroy" the chances for a negotiated peace in Cambodia; and more than that - strike a serious blow - at U.S. credibility right around the globe.

As expected - the President's action protests;

mainly in the Senate - where Mike Mansfield was expressing despair, shock, and alarm. The Senate Democratic leader also vowing to attach the same measure to bill after bill - until, "the will of the people prevails." In the House though - the President's veto was immediately sustained without debate.

Former Kansas City police chief Clarence Kelley is the enw head of the FBI. The Senate approving his nomination - by a vote of Ninty-Six "for," none against.

Senate Democrat Whip Robert Byrd - who fought the previous nomination of L. Patrick Gray - strongly supported Kelley; saying the new FBI head does not have a politically oriented background - and has had no connection with Watergate. Adding that he was confident that Kelley would "act quickly - to restore sagging morale."

Clarence Kelley - successor to fabled J. Edgar

Hoover; only the second man in U.S. history - to head the

nation's most prestigious police force.
