President Nixon continues to wind down the war. As you may have heard by now - the President today announcing plans to withdraw from Vietnam, May First - an additional seventy thousand men; thereby cutting total U.S. troop strength - to a mere sixty-nine thousand.

This a figure rapidly approaching the size of the residual force we left in South Korea - at the close of the fighting there. The President adding that "another announcement will be made - before May First - with regard to a further with Arawal."

Defense Secretary Laird, supplying additional details, said that South Vietnamese troops now have "the training, the equipment and the capability" - to win the "vast majority, seventy-five per cent or more," of their coming battles with the Communist forces.

Laird also criticizing a number of Democratic Presidential hopefuls - newly-critical of Administration war policy. These - said he - strangely silent when the

## PARIS FOLLOW WHITE HOUSE

Meanwhile, another session of peace talks in Paris. Number One Hundred and Forty, - about as fruitful as all the rest. Next question: Has the Governor considered yet the possibility of a running mate - a black, perhaps? Wallace Send he, "non replying: "No, I have not - and neither have I considered a white running mate."

#### KNOWLES
