The latest and most sensational thing tonight is a revelation of Nazi-Fascist plans. The story might sound like will a wild rumor, but it's printed in Rome - in the newspaper owned by Mussolini. Unification of all Europe in one political state - that's the Axis war aim.

When the news came of the Hitler-Mussolini conferences on the Eastern War Front, it was taken for granted that the two Dictators had drawn up some sort of peace program to compete with the Boosevelt-Churchill eight points.

They did, says Mussolini's newspaper. And that's the program. Europe to be one political state under the domination of the two axis powers. The comment in Rome is that this would fulfill the dream of Napoleon. The Great Corsican conqueror also wanted to unify Europe - under his command.

has become so definite that they've already created what the Roman newspaper story calls, "an kww European national flag".

It is described as containing the colors of every nation on the continent, and hazk has already been unfurled in the axis armies beside the national flags of Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy.

Berlin reports that the Blitzkrieg forces have now driven to within sixteen miles of Leningrad - they're within the suburbs. The point specified is near the old summer pal ace of the Czars, just south and a little west of Leningrad.

Berlin claims, moreove, that Panzer units have cut the last railroad line serving Russians next to the largest city. The main line, Moscow to Leningrad, was cut some days ago. That left the city with only a secondary railroad - to the East, connecting with Moscow in a roundabout way. This is the one the Nazi troops now have reached - according to Berlin. From the story, it would seem that the Germans are near the River Neva that famous Neva, which was almost another name for the St. Petersburg of t old, for Petrograd, and then Leningrad. If the Nazis have driven to the Neva, they're within a few miles of Lake and when they reach that lake, then Ladoga, Leningrad would be completely encircled, a ring of steel with the Finns driving from the North. Indeed, Berlin claims that the ring of steel is almost complete.

War bulletins tell of heavy and persistent raids, the flat Russian country turned into a sea of mud. Through this quagmire attacking columns are struggling on - Red columns both

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Red and Nazi. The Soviets are smashing with counter-attacks.

This is stated by Moscow, and admitted by Berlin. Russian

forces are making counter-drives in the center, trying to relieve

the pressure xxxxx against Leningrad. They're advancing, and

acoring successes, declares Moscow.

There are continuing reports that Finland is in a mood

to make peace - the Finns quite satisfied with getting back

the territory the Red Army took from them the winter before last.

They have won back all that ground, and are ready to call the

war off. That is the report - though it's officially denied in

Helsinki. However, today's news brings word that six members of

the Finnish parliament have been arrested. They're Socialists

what kind, but the arrests might well tie in with the stories

of moves in Finland for peace.

There's some official comment on that subject from

Moscow tonight. Soviet Vice-Commissar of Fareign affairs

Lozovsky states that Finland has been displaying an increasing

desire to end the war with the Soviets. The Vice-Commissar said

that this was because of the heavy losses the Finns have incurred in battle with the Red units. He denied, however, that any negotiations between Helsinki and Moscow have begun. He described stories to that effect in the following words:-"They do not correspond to reality."

Moscow gives us smmething about Turkey. The Vice-Commissar for Foreign affairs stated that the Nazis are likely to make an attempt against the country that controls the Dardanelled. He put it in these words:- "There is every possibility that the axis will exert pressure on Turkey."

Back to Washington - the French Ambassador stated today that he is going to protest to the United States Government

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York Herald Tribune. It stated that officials of the French
Embassy in Washington have been engaged in pro-Nazi activities.

That was printed; and now the Vichy Ambassador says he'll
protest.



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BRITISH-SOVIET

The latest from London is that Parliament may take a hand in the tempest of talk about British-Soviet relations. The verbal storm began today at the Congress of the British Trades Unions meeting at Edinburgh.

One prominent question before the Trades Union delegates was Soviet Russia and Communism. The Congress began by rejecting a proposal that the British Unions cooperate with the British Communist Party. Refusal to go into partnership with the Redeat home was based on the contention that they were - "Totally Unreliable." With that decision made, the trades Union Congress proceded to put its okay on the British-Soviet alliance, and the policy of aiding the Red Army in its fight against Nazi Germany.

Then came the bombshell - when Jack Tanner, President of the Amalgamated Engineering Dinon, got up and stated that there were people in high places who wer not enthusiastic form a Red Army victory. They don't want the boviets to win, any more than they want the Nazis to prevail. These people in high places, said Jack Tanner, would much prefer if the Nazis and the Soviets were to exterminate each other - and that would leave Great Britain

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as a dominant power in Europe.

"I think", he shouted, "That everyone will agree that such an attitude is a terrible danger. If Russia succeeds, we succeed," he cried. "If Russia fails, we fail."

That drew shouts of "No" from the trades Union Congress, but Jack Tanner continued in mi fiery fashion: "The impression is still very strong," he declared, "That certain elements desire to switch the war against Russia." And by that apparently he meant that certain elements in Great Britain would like to fight against the Soviets, instead of for them.

The sensation was complete then Jack Tanner named a name. He told of a certain high person ge, who had recently expressed the hope that the Nazis and Communists would exterminate each other. A cabinet member, the minister of aircraft production - kirmurant Lieutenant-Colonel John T.C. Moore- Brabazon.

Jack Tanner said that he could produce the evidence to prove that the Minister of Aircraft Production had expressed those views about Nazis, Soviets and extermination.

That's how the sensation broke, and it has had Britain

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in the Daily Mirror: "Union Chief accuses Minister - says he wants to see Soviet wiped out."" And the latest is that Parlia ent is likely to investigate the matter - did or it did not the Minister of Aircraft supply say held like to see the Soviets as well as the Nazis wiped out?

warplanes have arrived in Soviet Russia. This is on the basis of a Moscow radio dispatch heard in the British Capital. The Moscow broadcast stated that the first military aircraft had arrived - under the British-America-Soviet agreement to send Air Aid to the Red Army. London opinion is that no British planes have been sent to the Soviets as yet -- so they must be American aircraft. If so they must have been flown by way of Alaska and Siberia or via Africa and Persia.

Meanwhile, we are told that the Soviet Mission which has arrived in the United States via Alaska, is purely technical -- not poltical. Forty-seven technicians, headed by a Red Army General, are in this country to study our methods of aircraft production.

Great Britain's latest tragedy in the bomber ferry
service is the more sombre because of the distinguished persons
who perished. The first report from the London Air Ministry referred
to it as a big bomber transport flying from Canada to England. The
Royal Air Force Ferry Command makes the Statement as follows:
"The plane is now known to have crashed into a hillside somewhere
in an isolated mountainous district on the West Coast of England.

Ten persons were aboard the ill-fated plane - six

passengers and a crew of four. Two of the passengers were Americans,

one a flight engineer, - Charles Alvan Spence of Little Neck,

New York. The other - Captain Sherwood Picking of the United States

Navy , a distinguished officer who was on his way to become

Assistant Naval attache in London. Son of Rear Admiral Henry

Picking, he commanded a United States submarine during the World

War and later a submarine squadron in Asiatic waters. Captain

Picking was one of the Navy's foremost authorities in the realm

of undersea navigation.

One of the passengers was a high Belgian diplomat,
Count de Baillet Latour, Assistant Military Attache at the

Belgian Embassy in London. His father was president of the International olympics committee, and one of the foremost figures in the world of sports. The younger Count de Baillet Latour was well known in America - his wife an American. Makes She's the daughter of a state department official, James Clement Dunn, special assistant to the Secretary of State. In the spring of nineteen thirty-six, there was an elaborate Washington wedding when Count de Baillet Latour married Marianna Armour Dunn.

Everybody in diplomatic circles was there, with Secretary of State Cordell Hull heading the list of wedding guests.

The other passengers aboard the lost plane were British, and all men of distinction. Colonel L. H. Wrangham of the British

Imperial A.my, and principal technical officer Taylor of the

British Air ministry. One was a noted scholar and Historian, Dr.

Mowat of the British library of Information. He lectured at many

American Universities, and for two years was a visiting professor of History at the University of Wisconson.

Today's mishap is the third tragedy that has befallen the British bomber ferry command in three weeks. In the two





previous cases, big ferry transports crashed into British

hillsides as they were starting their flight westward to

Canada. Today's disaster differs in that it was an eastbound

plane that crashed - when I had almost reached its goal.

AMERICAN PLANE CRASH

Today at Hempstead, Long Island, an Army War plane crashed in the middle of the town. The plunging skycraft hit the ground and exploded at the corner of Florence and Jerusalem Abenues, a neighborhood of stores and homes - and only a few yards away was a children's playground. It was a sunden blasting catastrophe.

Second Lieutenant Roy Scott of the eighth pursuit group, was flying a swift air cobra. Something went wrong. Smoke spouted out of the plane. The Lieutenant took to his parachate, bailed out, drifted down.

Most of the grown-ups were injured in extinguishing the £xxxxx flaming clothing of the children. The parachuting pilot landed in a tree, and there he hung - until they got him down, uninjured.
