In the quest for peace in Southeast Asia - the main focus was still on the White House today. President Nixon meeting with his Joint Chiefs of Staff - to review "the entire situation in South Vietnam:" And then, he met a second time - with Nguyen Phu Duc, special emissary from South Vietnam's President Thieu.

The President later flying to Key Biscayne for the weekend. Henry Kissinger also will be there - for further talks - before returning to Paris this Bunday.

Meanwhile, at the pace table in Paris - the

Communist side is contending that peace negotiations are

deadlocked. But William Porter for the U.S. - expresses

a somewhat different view. Saying: "Those who know right

now aren't talking - and those who are talking don't know."

Porter also observed that "some news dispatches" have contained of late "an unwarranted amount of pessimism."

And he told newsmen: "I would caution you to take care lest you be caught with your pens down."

LAIRD FOLLOW PARIS

U.S. troop strength in Vietnam - now less than twenty-seven thousand men. So announced today - by Defense Secretary Melvin Laird; who said this more than meets - the President's December One withdrawal timetable.

Laird also sayd that he was recommending - that

there be no public announcements of future withdrawals.

Such announcements "would be a mistake" - said he - "and might interfere with peace negotiations."

From Saigon comes news of another milestone - in

the Vietnam war. The U.S. Command reporting today
there were no American servicemen deaths last week in

Indochina. None from combat - none from accidental

causes. The first such achievement - since early 'Sixty
Five.

The White House again - an announcement today that William Rogers is staying on as Secretary of State. He thus becomes the first of the President's first-term Cabinet - to be publicly assured that he will be held over in the second term.

For what it's worth though - Rogers is getting a whole batch of new assistants. As Number Two man - Department Kenneth Rush - who moves over from the Defense Pepartment as Undersecretary for Political Affairs - Paris peace negotiator William Porter; as Undersecretary for Economic Affairs - William Casey, up to now the head of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

At Cape Kennedy - the countdown begins. The men of Apollo-Seventeen - cranking up today for America's last and toughest assault on the moon. Astronauts Gene Cernan, Ron Evans and Jack Schmitt - primed and ready.

Their ground crews - hard at work. And the big event - now just six days away.

The Baptist Towers at Atlanta, Georgia - an elevenstory, ultra-modern home for the aged; normally, the height

In the Indian House of Parliament at New Delhi two days of heated debate on the future of Indian foreign
policy; ending up with a formal statement - from Indian
Foreign Minister Swaran Singh. "I can assure the House" said he - "that we shall do everything on our part - to
normalize relations with the United States." Singh adding:
"We have much in common - we have no basic conflict; there
is no reason why our relations should not only be normalized
- but also become friendly."

Singh also announced that India is now willing to resume cultural and trade relations - with Red China as well. "It is our firm belief" - said he - that India and China can and must normalize their relations - on the basis of peaceful coexistence."

This next - a report today from a special military banel a nd civilian to - on racial matters in the armed It's members well urging adoption of a number of new rules and regulations - to meet the demands of blacks. Among them, one - that "job assignments be based on aptitude" rather than written tests; two - that "persons be assigned to low-status of less desirable jobs - only on a volunteer or short-term rotating basis;" and three - that uniform caps should be redesigned - so that they can be worn more easily with so-called "Afro" hairdos.
