The nation's first draft lottery since World

War Two formally signed into law today at the White

House. President Nixon promptly scheduling a drawing

for next week to fill out the January draft call of twelve
thousand-five-hundred men. Selection to be based

solely on birth dates - as determined by the luck of the

draw.

This an effort to eliminate some of the inequities -- in the present Selective Service setup - said the President. He added - however, he will not be satisfied until the draft is eliminated entirely - giving way to an all volunteer army.

The White House - again - first official comment today on that alleged song My massacre in South Vietnam. White House Press Secretary Ron Ziegler asserting that the incident - if it truly occurred -- was "a direct violation" of U S military policy; and more than that - said he - an act "abhorent to the conscience of all the American people."

As to consequences - Ziegler noted that appropriate action is being taken. And he further pledged that any "illegal or immoral conduct as alleged" - will be "dealth with according to the xivink strict rules of military justice."
