BEIRUT

Rebel Moslems in Lebanon - finally bowed today to U.S., Syrian and Palestinian pressure; agreeing to a ten day "trial truce" to begin at noon, local time, tomorrow. Moslem leader Kamal Jumblatt, stressing, that a lasting peace is dependent on the resignation of Lebanon Christian President Suleiman Franjieh. Also demanding that Parliament begin the drafting of reforms - aimed at stripping Maronite Christians of their present favored status in Lebanon.

CAPITAL MILL

On Capitol Hill the House today approved a bill to reconstitute the Federal Election Commission, as required by the Supreme Court; also, voting a number of major revisions - in the law the Commission is supposed to administer; also turning back an attempt to extend Federal financing to Congressional elections. The bill now to go to a conference with the Senate - to iron out differences. Then the President may or may not veto it.

PLANE

The magazine New Scientist, published in Britain. tells about a revolutionary new Soviet spy plane. The Mig Twenty-Five Foxbat - said to be making regular reconnaissance flights over Western Europe and the British Isles; - a plane that flies so high and so fast - there is as yet no way to do anything about it. Speeds up to three times the speed of sound - at altigudes up to Ninety thousand feet. So far the only attempt to shoot one down - was not over Europe, but over Israel. An Israeli Phantom jet said to have fired a sidewinder misile at a Foxbat - but to no avail.

LONDON

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On the big London money market - the value of the British Pound again fell today, below a buck nimety - for the first time ever; finally ending up - at a dollar eighty-eightand-a-half. The drop blamed mainly on trickling wildcat strikes at British-Leyland - Britain's top auto maker and chief exporter.

STRIKES

Here at home - a series of strikes involving truck drivers - San Francisco city employees - TV newswriters and technicians - brewery workers - and others. Observers calling it the worst outbreak of labor strife in the U.S. - in more than a year.

BELFAST

The U.S. Ambassador to Britain, Anne Armstrong today visited bomb-torn Belfast in Northern Ireland; there saying a U.S. Customs team will arrive within ten days - to try and work out a plan for clamping down on illegal weapons shipments from the U.S.

KAMPALA

Bishop Abel Muzorewa, a black nationalist leader from Rhodesia - currently visiting Uganda, told a group of students how his followers are planning to escalate their guerilla Mar against Rhodesians white minority government. Bishop Muzorewa saying: "With the assistance of friendly countries, such as the Soviet Union and Cuba" - Rhodesian nationalists are now "in a position to step up the armed struggle." ROME

A long bitter battle in favor of abortion-on-demand in Italy - was rejected by the Italian Chamber of deputies by a narrow margin voting instead to limit it to therapeutic and rape cases.

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BLACKSBURG

Ever wonder how Abe Lincoln got his nickname -"honest Abe?" The answer - according to a Virginia Tech Sociologist - it was because he was such a good referee at Cock fights. Lincoln's interest in cock fighting, we hear was shared by George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, and Andrew Jackson.

Professor Clifton Bryant, says cock fighting also gave us words such as, cockpit, cocky, and even cocktail. "The winning cock" - he tells us - "normally toasted with an alcoholic drink - made up of as many ingredients as the number of feathers left on the tail of the cock. WHITE HOUSE

After a quiet year former Texas Governor Connally, was back in the Washington spotlight today. Standing with President Ford - as he was sworn in as a member of the President's new Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board.

Connally and his wife - also to dine tonight with the First Family; where of course, they are likely to discuss the May 1st Texas Primary.

BIRTHS

According to Census figures released tonight, the U.S. birthrate last year - "a new record low, - same for each successive year since 'Seventy-Two." Officials adding - it could go even lower. Young married women - planningto have fewer babies than any generation in a hundred years.

The Census Bureau also saying divorces last year topped the million mark for the first time in history; and the number of marriages - lowest since 'Sixty-Nine.

RUBENSTEIN

President Ford today also presented a

Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award - to famed pianist Arthur Rubenstein. The applause from onlookers lasting twominutes; Rubenstein, age Eighty-Nine - saying "I blush orally - because my old age doesn't allow me to blush in the usual way."

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FISH

A new book inspired by the Bicentennial -"New York State - Battleground of the Revolutionary War" by the legendary Hamilton Fish - who served for twenty-five years as a Congressman from New York. Ham Fish, age eighty-eight, saying was the cradle of the Revolution - but New York was "where it was at." The Empire State - scene of more battles than any other state - more than ninty in all; many of which he tells about - in this unusual book. Ham diam Fish adding that New York's part in our Revolutionary War has been largely overlooked by historians.

FERGUS FALLS

From Fergus Falls Community College in Minnesota we hear of male backlash. A pair of male freshmen demanding trial on the new Fergus Falls Girls Ball Team; Coach Gloria Peters saying: "The courts have agreed it is not a contact sport - so males must be accepted."
