Industrialists of Nazi Germany went on trial today. Twenty-four top ranking executives of the great I.G. Farben Chemical Trust, which is called "The greatest industrial combine in the world: fx2 At Nuremberg, they faced the court today, charged with war crimes on the Nazi industrial front. The American prosecutor opened with a scathing indictment:- "These," he cried, "are the men who made war possible, and they did it because they wanted to conquer."

The Inter-American Treaty, that is vast western hemisphere defense pact, will be signed at Rio next reduced. This was announced today, along with decisions that make the treaty a pole-to-pole affair.

Conference at Rio had expanded the Monroe Doctrine to include Canada and Greenland. Today the proposal of a Western Hemisphere Security Zone was expanded still further - to include a large segment of the Antarctic Continent. This applies to that part of the Antarctic land which faces the southern tip of South America - the E Western Hemisphere Security Zone to extend to the South Pole.

The inclusion of Canada and Greenland move it up toward the North Pole. So, in effect, the region protected by the new extension of the Monroe Doctrine will reach from one tip of the world to the other; from North Pole to South Pole.

The White House announces that President Truman willleave by plane, Sunday morning, for Rio, accompanied by Mrs. Truman and Margaret. On the way, stops will be made at Trinidad, and at Belem, Brazil, at the mouth of the Amazon.

The President will address the final plenary session of the conference at the fifteen million dollar quitandinha Hotel at the mountain resort town of Trapatian, and witness the signing of the treaty. It is expected his speech will be broadcast round the world.

The REEN return Presidential journey will be made aboard the battleship "Missouri" with stops at Saint Thomas in the Virgin Isles, and Ax at San Juan, Puerto Rico.

U.N. FOLLOW AMERICAN LEGION

Soviet Russia has just given a blunt warning to the United Nations - warning against attempts to tamper with the veto. Today in the Security Council a debate was opened on that explosive subject, and the Syrian Premier, acting as Council President, suggested that the big powers should give up their veto. That drew a menacing Soviet statement - Gromyko warning that attempts to fool around with the veto, so much used by Soviet Russia, might wreck the United Nations completely.

Today brings the first nation to give an official and complete okay to the U.N. Plan for outlawing atomic warfare. What nation? The U.S.A.

energy has been repared by a board of experts on which every member of the United Nations is represented - except Soviet Russia. The Soviets would have no part in the drawing mpmfxmxm up of a world program for a strict international system to prevent nations from arming for atomic war. The U.N. Atomic Energy Commission has handed in its control plan which will now go before the United Nations.

what will happen in the face of the Soviet veto? You make your guess. But, anyway, the United States today was the first to come forward, saying yes - our delegation announcing official American approval.

Late this afternoon, a recommendation was issued on the subject of how much our government should spend on science. One per cent of the national income, is the suggestion. In other words two billion dollars a year. Two billion is what it took to develop the atomic bomb.

The report emanates from the scientific research board appointed by President Truman last October to make a study of the needs of American science. The board notes that Soviet Russia is reported to be spending the equivalent of a billion, two hundred million dollars on scientific research this year, and has embarked on a five year plan designed to train a hundred and forty thousand scientists and engineers a year. Right now the chief lack of American science is a shortage of personnel. a shortage of scientists. Hence the board proposes the government establishment of national scholarships for students in technology.

There's new world about the mystery mountain of Tiber - supposed to be higher than Everest. During the war-years we had repeated stories of airmen flying in the region of the Himalayas, who said they had spotted a peak more than thirty thousand feet tall. Mount Everest is twenty nine thousand, a hundred and forty one. The Army Air Forces never ventured an official opinion pointing to the fact that flyers can only judge by their. altimeters-and those instruments for recording height have a way of being slightly uncertain. Now, however, it turns out that flights were made to scout the mystery mountain, flights about which the Air Forces know nothing

This is disclosed by our old explorer scientist friend, Roy Chapman Andrews, who has taken my place on the air a number of times when I've been away. Dr.

Andrews has data showing Army, that flyers, beguiled by the mystery of the mountain, sneaked off to have a look see - on their own, without orders. Roy Chapman Andrews has letters indicating that at least seven such clandestine flights were made, the letters asking that the names of the flyers be kept secret,

since the mountain-scouting was against the rules.

The are all certain that the mystery mountain is above thirty thousand feet - making it higher than Everest. Excerpts of the letters are printed in the illustrated magazine "Pic", and here's an example of what they state. One letter relates that an air Force Major, whose name is left blank, flew to the area of the mystery mountain. The weather was cloudy, and he went winging just:

above a dense overcast. His altimeter showed that the overcast was up to thirty thousand feet. Then he spied a summit thrust above the cloud layer - a peak sticking out above the thirty thousand feet overcast.

Roy Chapman Andrews tells us that the name of the mountain is Amne Machin - and it's in the wildest of the Himalayas along the border of China and Tibet, the with home of a lierce tribe called the Gnoloks. He says the existence of the peak higher than Everest has long the himself been rumored. He picked up the report in China back in Nineteen Twenty-Seven - and later planned to seek it out in partnership with the late General Theodore Roosevelt,

young Teddy, who gave his life in the war.

Today Roy Chapman Andrews is urging that an expedition be formed to check definitely on the very strong evidence that Amne Machin is higher than Everest. He, himself, has no idea of going -- that, says he, is an ardous task for younger men. But Roy Chapman Andrews points out that in this highly advanced year of Nineteen Forty-Seven we still don't know what really is the highest point on this earth of ours.

During the war when I flew to the border between
Tiber and Sichong, deep in Central Aisa, I discussed this
Amne Machin enigma with Captain Pottschmidt of CNAC and
other Central Asian fliers. They were allinterested in
solving this old Amne Machin riddle. I myself would
like to get in on the expedition that how Chapman
Andrews suggests -- say along about next April.
