GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

The Governor of New York declares a state of

ice - nine inches thick, all the way south to Poughkeepsie

A number of places were hard hit by a break-down of heating facilities. In Oswego, a break in a gas main. A fire broke out in a pumping station. And gas had to be cut off in some fifteen thousand buildings, in that extreme cold.

Thirty thousand people without heat, hot water or hot food. The Red Cross rushed in cots, to be used in schools and other public buildings that are heated by coal or oil. The only places thousands might go to when their own homes became like ice-boxes.

As soon as the gas main break was repaired workers went around to every house - turning n the gas
with Oswego hoping to be back to normal by tomorrow.

As for the weather, it shows no signs of returning to normal. The thermometer still far below along Lake Ontario.

EISENHOWER

President Eisenhower flying east from Arizona,
today had a look at sections of Colorado and Kansas,
and he heard how millions of acres are now in danger
of being blown away by dust storms. He also heard much
of the plight of farmers and ranchers.

When the presidential plane landed at Pueblo, Colorado - in a light snow - the President was met by Governor McNichols, a Democrat, and former Governor Johnson, a Republican. After hearing from the Colorado Drought Committee how many Colorado ranchers have run out of credit trying desperately to hold onto cattle that now are hardly worth the feed they eat, the President flew on to Garden City, Kansas. There his plane circled above a five hundred foot ceiling for twenty minutes. Finally, the Columbine Third dropped down - landing in heavy snow. At the Garden City airport, the President conferred with more farm experts who told him that the top-soil from ten million acres - may be

carried away by the Spring winds. That only rain will save them. They told him that Kansas has received less rain in the past five years - than in any similar period since the Weather Bureau started keeping records, seventy years ago.

Later, in Wichita - Mr. Eisenhower announced that he will ask Congress for Seventy Six million dollars.

That much needed, right away - to help the farmers.

PLANE FOLLOW EISENHOWER

When President Eisenhower left Pueblo, Colorado, he was unaccompanied by the members of the press who had been following. As their plane was taxiing down the runway - suddenly the concrete gave way. The wheels, sinking through up to their axels. The plane, jolting to a stop. No one was hurt - but the newsmen aboard had to get out - and they spent the rest of the day, trying to catch up with the President.

The accident is blamed on the state of the concrete - which was laid down in Nineteen Forty-Two - when Pueblo Airport was an Army base. The President's plane had gotten off because it happened to us a part of the runway - that was rebuilt last year.

Senate Committees today heard more testimony from Secretary of State Dulles - about the "Eisenhower doctrine". About the possibility that we may get into a war in the Middle East - if Congress does put its approval on the Eisenhower plan - to use money and troops, if necessary. It is the Dulles view that the danger is just the other way. The "Eisenhower doctrine" - to prevent war. The chances, in the Secretary's judgment much less than fifty-fifty - that the President would ever have to use our troops. But, that there is great danger of our being involved in a Middle East war - if Congress turns down the President's request.

At one point, Senator Kefauver wanted to know why the "Eisenhower doctrine" was drawn up - with no consultations between Washington, London, and Paris.

Secretary Dulles replied that such consultations would have doomed the plan from the start - because of anti-British and anti-French feeling in the Arab nations.

EGYPT

The Soviet Assistant Military Attache in Washington accused of violating his diplomatic status - by purchasing electronics equipment - and trying to get military secrets. Activities that our State Department terms "highly improper". So, back to Moscow - goes the Red military attache.

COMMUNIST

A former - of Reds in this country pleads guilty of reentering illegally. Irving Potash, who was picked up by the F.B.I. eleven days ago.

Deported to his native Poland he managed to return - as he put it, to see his family. However it is believed that Potash is a Kremlin courier - sent here to bring new instructions to the American Communist Party - now badly split by the downgrading of Stalin.

The Soviet Government reopened the Lenin-Stalin tomb, in Moscow, today. And we have the answer to one question - that a lot of Westerners have been asking.

Was the tomb really closed - so that Khrushchev could get rid of the remains of Joe Stalin? Many thought surely that was the reason. After all Khrushchev had exposed Stalin as a murderous tyrant.

But the answer seems to be - no. When the tomb was opened today, there were the remains of Stalin, beside Lenin; - with long lines of Russians - moving through to see all that remains of these two founders of the Soviet state. Stalin, still there - even tho Khrushchev proclaimed him a murderer, a tyrant and so on.

British reports tell how at the southwestern tip

of Arabia - the troops of Yemen now have invaded the

Aden protectorate in force. Yemeni troops and guerrillas

- crossing the border - occupying some sixty square miles

of Britains's protectorate. The British say these

mountain raiders are armed with automatic weapons.

Altho' their guerrillas are barefoot as usual, waging

war with the same primitive spears and knives they've

used for centuries.

Like something out of comic opera? This was between Yemen and Aden. It's a serious conflict for the British - who are struggling to hold their strategic position at the southern end of the Red Sea.

In Singapore, a spokesman for the British Navy says that a submarine loaded with sunken treasure - is lying in the Pacific, or rather the Straits of Malacca just off the island of Penang. According to this officer, it's a Japanese sub - that was sent out during World War II, to carry gold bullion and precious ornaments from Japan to Germany. Apparently sent to the bottom by Allied sub chasers - near renang. Loaded with bullion and precious ornaments - worth millions. So it looks as if treasure hunters will be busy in those Mala yan waters - trying to get to the sunken submarine.

In Tokyo, Japanese officials say they know nothing of treasure sent out by undersea boat during the war. That anyone who investigates may find sunken Japanese submarines - but, treasure? They say, no.
