Bidault.

Scotland Yard has a pecial assignment -- tonight
The order from Number Ten Downing Street -- "Find
Bidault!" Prime Minister Machillan is worried
by the rumor -- that Bidault may still be in London,

that consulting his henchmen -- about a plot to
murder the President of France. It's up to
Scotland Yard to find the leader of the French
terrorist group -- before he launches any of his
gunmen across the Channel, and on to Paris.

All of which follows -- that controversial program over the B.B.C., Bidault, describing -- his clandestine organization. Confessing that his aim is -- to give France a new government.

Refusing to give a plain answer to the question -- "Are you planning to assassinate de Gaulle?"

when the President smiled. His answer -- no comment.

Why not? "It would take at least a half-hour

program on a national network," said he.

On other questions, President Kennedy had some answers -- as you may have heard. Emphasizing -- Cuba, The President, saying -- that the Russians are not pulling out fast enough. That a blockade would be an act of war -- and would not be justified, at this time. And that the four American flyers lost during the Bay of Pigs operation -- were serving, in the President's words, "on a voluntary basis."

western political scientists call this Russian argument -- either hypocritical or naive. A perfect system, if it existed -- would have more opposition than one half of one percent. There are just too many cranks and misfits in any population -- to allow an approach to unanimity in any election.

The real answer -- Soviet elections are put-up jobs. Only one slate of candidates -- to vote for.

And just who checks the election figures -- before the Communist Party releases them?

Vatican.

The idea of a Soviet ambassador at the Vatican 
with its reserve beguiling. Picture a devotee of

atheistic Communism -- negotiating with the head of

Catholic Christianity. Two creeds -- on opposite

sides of the table. One, centuries old -- and still

going strong. The other, born in the nineteenth

century -- and evidently destined to die in the

twentieth. At least, some experts believe -- that

Communism is disintegrating.

Stalin once asked cynically -- "How many army divisions has the Pope?" Khrushchev, the great destaliniser -- has a different attitude. His son-in-law said in Rome today -- that it might be a good idea to have diplomatic ties between Moscow and the Vatican.

Newsman.

The British House of Lords has come out against—
what we Americans tend to regard as a basic right
of a free press. The right of a newsman to
conceal -- the sources of a story.

This case, as you may remember -- concerns convicted Communist spy, William Vassall. Two London reporters came up with scoops on the story -- Reggie Foster of the "Sketch" and Brendan Mulholland of the "Mail." They were ordered by a court -- to reveal their sources of information. Both -- pleaded journalistic privilege. Both -- went to jail. Both -- appealed.

That's how the case arrived at the House of
Lords -- Britain's highest tribunal. Their
Lordships -- thredwing throwing out the appeal.
Telling the newsmen to answer the questions -- or
cool their heels in the pokey.
