

## DELEGATES

*A Federal Appeals Court ruled today that those one-hundred-fifty-three California convention delegates - taken from Senator McGovern by the Democratic credentials committee - must be returned to McGovern. The ruling says the McGovern delegates must be seated at the convention, and that California's winner-take-all primary is constitutional.*

*However, the Appeals Court upheld the credentials committee's action in unseating fifty-nine Illinois delegates headed by Chicago Mayor Daley. But we now learn that the Democratic National Committee will ask The Supreme Court to reverse today's ruling on the McGovern delegates and divide them between the candidates - in other words reverse The Federal Appeal Court.*

## **PRICES**

*The Nixon Administration called ~~in~~ twenty-four grocery chain executives to Washington today for some face-to-face tough talk about the rising cost of foods. It was the first of three sessions with food industry representatives - ordered by President Nixon to meet the persistent problem of high prices.*

## JETS

The Boeing Company now has government permission to sell Red China one-hundred-fifty-MILLION dollars worth of Seven-oh-Seven commercial jets and spare parts. Boeing and the Chinese, however, must still come to terms for the sale.

## FOREIGN

South Korean Premier Kim Jong-Pil warned his countrymen today - NOT to expect an immediate end to hostilities between North and South Korea - even though both countries have agreed to seek peaceful reunification.

Kim says many difficulties lie ahead in reunifying the <sup>it</sup> land which has been divided now for twenty-seven years.

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In Tokyo, newly-elected Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka says his government will continue to maintain strong relations with the United States as a basis for foreign policy. Also, better relations will be sought with China.

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In Paris, French Premier Chaban-Delmas and his cabinet resigned today - and President Pompidou promptly named former overseas minister Pierre Messmer to succeed. The resignations enable Pompidou to build a new cabinet, hopefully <sup>one</sup> to present a stronger front in next year's elections.

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And in Rome, members of the Italian Parliament

The existence of the "securities-for-rent" racket was first revealed to the public by Daniel Malachuk, director of a Wall Street firm, who told insurance people that underworld operators are becoming more knowledgeable about securities than most Wall Street workers. Much of the actual stealing, says Malachuk, is done by clerical workers in brokerage houses and banks - then sold to unsuspicious characters who offer them for rent. Some building contractors, for instance, have been known to rent stolen securities and put them up as collateral on mortgage loans. Many of the certificates are simply used as collateral for bank loans. When the loan comes due, the bank discovers it has been sold - with the borrower vanishing into thin air. Federal agents manage to recover about twenty-five MILLION dollars in stolen

## **SCHUSTER**

*The death of ninety-nine-year-old George Schuster in Springville, New York, revives memories of that Great Round-the-World Auto Race of Nineteen-Oh-Eight - a race won by George Schuster and his companions in their four-cylinder, sixty-horsepower Thomas Flyer - Sixty-Four years ago. There were six entries in the race, and Schuster's team reached the finish line first - after driving thirteen-thousand-three-hundred miles in one-hundred-sixty-nine days.*

*While crossing the snow-covered Rocky Mountains, the car had to use the Union Pacific's railroad tracks, for in those days there were No roads in many parts of Western America. The Union Pacific NOT only allowed Schuster to use the tracks but also scheduled his Thomas Flyer as if it were a regular train. Once they even had the San Francisco Express bearing down on them.*

*After being transported by boat across the Pacific*

*Ocean the car got bogged down in Siberian mud, and Schuster commandeered forty Russian soldiers to pull them out.*

*After overcoming all odds, Schuster and his grimy, khaki-clad companions arrived triumphantly before cheering crowds in Paris - only to be promptly flagged down by a gendarme. The charge - driving without lights in the Place de l'Opera. George was thirty-five years old then, Warren. And he lived to be almost one-hundred!*
