GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

In London they are saying that the Big Four conference, next month, will probably last longer - than four days.

The Soviets, as we have heard, think it should - although they accepted a four-day invitation.

The British government has indicated that they will not oppose an extension, if there is a legitimate need. France favors a few days more. Although President Eisenhower is on record - as opposed to any dragged out palaver, even he has said that he'll set no rigid limit on time.

So, according to all signs, the Geneva get-together will last longer than the scheduled four days.

West Germany may pick the Big Four confab - as a time to start negotiations with Soviet Russia. German observers will attend the Geneva conference, and Foreign Minister von Brentano today stated - that the German observers might have talks with the Russian delegates. Take the opportunity to pave the way for a possible

meeting, later, between Chancellor Adenauer and Soviet Premier Bulganin.

The Russians have invited Adenauer to Moscow - for discussion of such matters as German unity. Today, Von Brentano intimated - that the Adenauer-Bulganin meeting might be held in Geneva, instead of Moscow.

All of which brings West Germany prominently into the Geneva picture.

Meanwhile, Nationalist China gives warning - that

Chiang Kai Shek will not recognize any Geneva decision affecting

its even interests. Today the National Assembly on Formosa

sent cables to President Eisenhower, British Prime Minister

Anthony Eden, and French Premier Edgar Faure - reminding them

that the Chiang Kai Shek regime will not be represented at

the conference. They will pay no attention to Big Four

decisions - if their interests are injured.)

MENON

India's roving Ambassador Krishna Menon conferred with President Eisenhower at the White House today. He says he is "considerably encouraged" about the possibility of peace in the Far East. Encouraged -- by his talks with the President.

The President and the Chancellor, with names that rhyme - had a conference at the White House, today. Leaders of countries in bitter warfare, a decade ago, they're meeting in an atmosphere of most cordial friendship.

The word in Washington is that President Eisenhower and Chancellor Adenauer, today, agreed to block any Soviet move to neutralize Germany, as a price for unification. They issued a joint statement - rejecting "neutrality" for West Germany.

Eighty_four Senators replied, and seventy-three believe - that President Eisenhower will accept the G O P nomination again. Thirty-nine Republicans are of this opinion and thirty-four Democrats. Eight think the President would refuse the nomination - five Democrats and three Republicans. Three are undecided - they can't make a guess.

Seventy-eight Senators name Adlai Stevenson as the Democratic nominee. Thirty-nine Democrats and thirty-nine Republicans. Six think he won't run - four Republicans, two Democrats.

So, in the opinion of the U.S. Senate - Nineteen-Fifty-Six will be Nineteen-Fifty two all over again.
