GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Raymond Cobb, "the Georgia Peach", perhaps the greatest player in the history of our national game. Ty Cobb - and Babe Ruth. The "Georgia Peach" could do a lot of things on the diamond - that the Babe couldn't.

Never was there a more electrifying baserunner than Ty Cobb. Its a matter of baseball folklore - how
the Tiger outfielder used to slide into a base, with
dirt and spikes flying. Tyrus Raymond Cobb - the player
who set the all-time record for stolen bases - eighthundred and ninety-two of them. In one season - ninetysix. Once, Cobb scored all the way from first - on an
infield out. Another time, he scored from third - on
in infield fly.

He was the game's greatest hitter - if you go by average instead of homers. Cobb's batting average for

twenty-three seasons - an incredible three-sixty-seven.

For three consecutive seasons, he hit - better than

four-hundred. Below thmee-hundred, exactly once in

twenty-three years - when he came up to the Detroit

Tigers as a rookie in 1905. He was the American League

batting champion twelve times - nine in succession. And

in the era of the dead ball - he hit over a hundred

homers.

Now passing - at the age of seventy-four.

Survivor and brightest star of baseball's most colorful era - Ty Cobb, the first to make the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown.

At Cape Canaveral, as you have heard, they are getting set for tomorrow's space shot, with Air Force Captain Virgil Grissom scheduled to ride a redstone rocket into space - tomorrow morning. Up, up for more than a hundred miles - and then down the Atlantic range where his capsule is supposed to come down by parachute, in the water, off the Bahamas.

Tonight scores of experts are going through last minute routine - to be ready for tomorrow morning when America's second Astronaut will be riding a rocket into space. On the beach - a big crowd, camping there all night long, in order not to miss - Captain Grissom's take-off.

One important point. If this flight goes as well as the last one - it may mark the end of the sub-orbital experiments, with our third American astronaut to be sent into an orbit around the earth.

The Chancellories of the world are trying to guess - the contents of the three notes delivered in Moscow today. Details, not to be made public - until tomorrow. But some reducated guesses - are possible. Its taken for granted that Britain, France and the United States are saying "no" - to Khrushchev's demand that West Berlin be turned into a free city. The Allies, also refusing to recognize Khrushchev's right - to sign a separate peace treaty with his East German puppets. Nor will the west attend any conference of the fifty-two nations - that fought against Nazi Germany in World War Two.

The Allies are not stopping with a rejection of Moscow propoganda. Their notes are said to contain a proposal - for free elections in East Germany. London, Paris and Washington, putting Khrushchev on a spot - he doesn't like. Challenging him to apply to his own

empire - the anti-colonialism that he defends so energetically everywhere else. Everywhere - in the Free World.

DISARMAMENT

The atmosphere in Moscow is - chilly. No, that's not - a thermometer reading. It refers to - the disarmament talks. John McCloy, special advisor to the President - is in the Soviet capital, Conferring with - Deputy Foreign Minister Zorin. Not getting - anywhere. Reason - the Berlin crisis, and Khrushchev's belligerent talk about strengthening his armed forces. The Soviet Dictator - causing a political chill in Moscow.

Tonight the Congo appears to be slipping - back toward anarchy. Provincial leaders, again facing one another - in open hostility. Leftist Gizenga, receiving a Soviet diplomatic mission - which is advising him in his bid to become head of all the Congo. Over on the Right, Tshombe repeating that secessionists Katanga Province is not going to be represented in the Leopoldville Parliament. So There's talk in Leopoldville of using force - to bring Katanga into a Congolese union.

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One spokesman, terming Katanga's independence - " a

myth." Exactly how to dispel the myth - is the problem.

The Premier of Iraq failing to frighten Kuwait with that show of military force, is turning to blandishments, telling his Kuwait neighbors that he
intends to intruduce land reforms, when he seizes
Kuwait. Take the big estates - from the Sheiks. Give
the land to - the small farmers of Kuwait.
