EASTERN

Eastern Airlines has resumed limited operations, despite a month-long strike of Flight Engineers.

The first jet took off from Miami to New York this noon, with ~~no commercial passengers aboard. The airline said it didn't have time to attract customers. There were~~ ten Eastern employees or their dependants ^{aboard} ~~aboard~~ each of whom paid a Five dollar service charge. So the revenue for the trip was Fifty Dollars. GENEVA

Laos is guaranteed in writing as a mutual and independent State tonight.

Foreign ministers of fourteen Western, communists, and neutral countries signed the accord for Laos at Geneva.

President Kennedy, in a message from Washington, called it a "significant milestone" toward furthering world

peace. ^{that} But he cautioned, the agreement represents a solemn commitment not only to the United States, but by all other signatories, to insure a free and independent neutral Laos."

(A Laotian spokesman, ^{said} neutralist Premier Souvanna-Pheum saying, in Geneva, to the delegates:- "I am deeply touched, and beg you to accept the gratitude of the Laotian government and of the Laotian people as a whole."

EGYPT

A grinning President Nasser of the United Arab Republic showed off his rockets again today - the second public display in three days.

A three hour ^{parade} ~~parade~~ through the streets of Cairo, ~~was~~ reviewed by Nasser and his War Minister, Field Marshall Abdel Hakim Amer - who shouted that the twenty new rockets on display were for protection against what he called: "The treacherous enemy of Israel."

Also displayed for the first time were several heavy Soviet-built T-54 tanks; Russian made twin Jet ~~Bombers~~ and mig-fighters.

All this, said Amer - makes the United Arab ^{Republic} ~~country~~ ^{Egypt} ~~country~~ the strongest in the middle East.

ECUADOR

A South American head of state was welcomed in Washington today. President Carlos Julio Arosemena of Ecuador getting full red carpet honors at the airport, as he was met by President Kennedy, and his mother - Mrs. Rose Kennedy, ^{who is acting} ~~she is standing in~~ as official hostess, while the President's wife is vacationing at Cape Cod.
