GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Reports from Argentina - that the Argentine Navy
still holds out against Peron, the strong man. Demanding
- that he be removed from power, placed aboard ship and sent out of the country.

Such is the word in Chile - from persons in close touch with the situation, in Argentina. They say, moreover, that two Naval bases are still holding out.

Having played a part in the abortive revolution last month - and still refusing to submit to Peron. Puerto Belgrano, on the Atlantic, and Ensenada, on the Rio de la Plata - are the Naval bases named.

The Argentine Army is pictured as wanting to get rid of Peron too - but wants to do it gradually, to avoid disturbances. Peron's control of the principal labor union - being a factor.

There's a report of a court martial - of Rear

Admiral Olivieri, former Minister of the Navy.

Accused - of being a leader of the anti-Peron revolution

that failed.

Evidence for the defense has been presented against Borlenghi, who was Minister of the Interior at
the time of the revolt, Borlenghi - a Peronist, in
charge of the police.

One event leading to the revolt was a burning of the Argentina flag - attributed to the Catholics. Which was followed by a descretation of chruches - by Peron adherents - and then the insurrection was on.

Court martial testimony is - that the burning of the Argentine flag was actually ordered - by Borlenghi.

Who was removed from office - following the revolt.

He has left the country, is now in New York.

Where, today, Borlenghi denied - that he had anything to do with the flag burning.

DULLES

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles expressed eptimitiem, today - concerning the Geneva conference. Taking of f on a flight to Europe, the Secretary said he feels the meeting of the Big Four will carry on what he called - "our unceasing quest for a secure and just peace."

He gave assurance that the United States, Great Britain and Prance see "eye to eye" on major problems - as they meet, at the "summit" with Soviet Russia.

FRANCE

French President Edgar Faure proposes - that money saved from disarmament should be used for the economic development of backward countries. At a news conference, in Paris, President Faure made the statement, with Poreign Minister Panay, at his side. Which added authority to the statement - that disarmament, with proper controls, would promote the cause of European security. The major powers would save - billions. Which they could put into an international fund - to help backward nations develop economically.

That's an idea, which has been suggested - from time to time - by other countries, including the United States.

BRITAIN - BOMB

London reports that Britain's hydrogen bomb is "on the way to completion." With a test explosion scheduled - in the near future.

This we learn thru the London Daily Mail, which adds that Britain's hydrogen bomb test will be staged - at sea. But the exact place, and the time of the explosion, the "where," and the "when," - a carefully guarded secret.

ATOMIC SHIP

A Congressional committee recommends - a substitute for President Eisenhower's atomic peace ship. The Merchant Marine Committee of the House - wanting a vessel that would be useful, commercially.

The President, suggesting his round-the-world atomic ship, proposed an existing type of hull, driven by an existing type of atomic engine. But the committee now suggest - that a specially designed ship be built, with an atomic engine especially adapted to maritime use. This, they say, would be a contribution to atomic "art."

The Soviets' new look features - visits to Moscow.

The Communist capital - offering hospitality, unheard

of in the days of Stalin. Among other things - leaders of

non-Communist nations are asked - for the purpose of friendly

discussions. The latest - the Shah of Iran.

A dispatch from Thoram says: "The Shah has accepted, and will make a State visit to Moscow in the near future."

(All of which is interpreted - as a Soviet attempt to persuade Iran to stay out of an alliance with the west.)

BARUCH

Today, Bernard Baruch, the elder statesman, is at the White House - conferring with President Eisenhower. Subject - the Big Four meeting at Geneva next week.

The eighty-five year old financier showed up - limping along - with an injured hip. When asked about it, he admitted he had hurt himself, while making a back dive into a swimming pool. At his estate in South Carolina, the elder statesman tried to back flip into the water - and slipped.

So to the news reporters, he said: "I hate to see this in the papers. Because people will think - only a fool, at the age of eighty-five, would try diving backwards."

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The "best man in the cabinet" has resigned - and it's a lady. Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby - today quit her post as Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Resignation accepted by President Eisenhower - in a public ceremony without precedent, at the White House. Mrs. Hobby praised in the highest terms. The President called her:

The retirement of Mrs. Hobby has been reported for some time. She was criticized for her handling of the Salk vaccine program. But the word was that she would step out - because of the illness of her seventy-seven year old husband in Houston, Texas, publisher and former governor, V. P. Hobby. Word from Houston is that Mrs. Hobby will become newspaper president of the Houston Post - succeeding her husband.

The new Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare is

Marion Folsom. Hitherto - Under Secretary. Former executive

of the Eastman Kodak Company - and an expert on social security

problems.

MRS. MILLER

At Brattleboro, Vermont, Mrs. Lucille Miller was convicted, today - of advising young men to dodge the draft.

During a trial, the forty-four year old Vermont housewife admitted that she gave the advice. Explaining - that she wanted to make a test case of the Selective Service Act. She - believing the draft is unconstitutional. So she advised young men to ignore it.

JET LINERS

The Boeing Company of Seattle has been told - go ahead and build passenger jet airliners. The Air Force - giving permission. This also applies to jet tanker airplanes, which the commercial airliner is a modified version.

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PLANE CRASH

Out here in California, a crash of an Air Force refueling plane. Which indicates the flaming character of the disaster.

It occurred near Merced. Ground observers - reporting that one engine of the plane caught fire. Followed by the crash, in which eleven crewmen were killed - no survivors.

The flaming explosion of the refueling plane set fire to and the stubble of a grain field, burnt out some twenty acres.

New York had a helicopter crash, today - in dramatic circumstances. The flying machine was trying to land on the roof of the Port of New York Authority Building, Lixteen stories tall. Flames - extinguished by firemen.

Two men were aboard the helicopter, both were injured - taken to a hospital.
