In support of its conclusion, the committee as asserting there is no evidence - "of any discernible impact on voter behavior from such broadcasts." Contending what's more, that a prohibition on broadcast returns until all polls are closed - would be "too drastic a step and por a raise grave constitutional questions of xo free speech."

At nearby Arlington, Virginia - a sanity hearing today for the man accused of slaying American Nazi leader George Lincoln Rockwell. Three court-appointed psychiatrists there agreeing - that John Patler is mentally competent to stand trial.

Judge Jackson Embrey, therefore, rejecting a prosecution request - that Patler be sent to a mental institution for more tests. Instead, setting a hearing for next week -- to consider a reduction in Patler's fifty thousand dollar bail.

All this - despite a psychiatric report of ten years ago; that Patler suffered from paranoid symptoms - that he was a "potential murderer." One of the psychiatrists who made the earlier report - "had no business" doing so.

All the evidence indicating - said he - that Patler has displayed "no major zo mental disorder" -- now or ever.
