GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

U.S. Marines to land in Siam - Thailand tomorrow. A battalion of eighteen hundred, to go **HAMME** ashore - ready for action. The advance guard of an American force - of five thousand men. Their first mission - to preserve the independence of Thailand; throw back any Red invaders from Laos, who might cross the wide river Mekong.

This mission could lead automatically - to an American defense of Laos. Because, north and south -Laotian territory extends on both sides of the Mekong.

Bangkok breathing a little easier tonight. The capital of Thailand, rolling out the welcome mat for the Americans. The Thais, anxious to see the U.S. Marines join their own army - which numbers a hundred and twenty thousand men. American troops, a guarantee, they hope, that Thailand will not become - another Lage KENNEDY There was, as you may have heard, attme conference at the White House today.- we With Bi-partisan, President Kennedy, inviting the leaders of both parties - to a session lasting almost an hour. Subject southeast Asia. Emphasizing - Laos. The President, explaining the administration strategy - for countering the Red thrust across Laos to the Mekong River.

We are told that President Kennedy wanted this meeting with Republicans and Democrats - before American troops landed in Thailand. Mr. Kennedy, knowing that Bangkok was about to announce - approval of the landing. The President, anxious to discuss this move - with the landing on whom he refers for support in Congress.

The importance of Thailand in our strategy - is geographically self evident. Theiland borders Laos - along the Mekong River. Hence, the best base of operations - should

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we decide on military action against the Red guerrillas of face.

LAOS FOLLOW TROOPS

In Laos the loyalist army is reported fighting back - and recovering some lost ground. Today, patrols pushed into one town - scene of a recent key guerrilla victory. The patrol found the town wrecked and burning - but no sign of the rebels.

Some military experts interpret the Laotian civil war - as something of a chess game. Neither side, able to hold - all of Laos. Each side, making quick strikes - at key enemy strongholds. The rebels, driving into - the provinces of the northeast. The loyalists, using the Mekon to transport battle units - to Laotian ports, downriver.

RUSSIA FOLLOW LAOS

The administration hopes to see something tangible come out of - today's agreement between Secretary of State Rusk and the Soviet Ambassador. The joint communique - seems clear enough. Dobrynin and Rusk, stating their mutual determination - to maintain the cease-fire in Laos. Reaffirming the Kennedy-Khrushchev declaration of Vienna, calling for a neutral and independent Laos. Will Khrushchev now act - on this communique? Washington is waiting - for the answer.

NEW GUINEA

Dutch military units in New Guinea are hunting for enemy paratroopers; the Indonesians dropped along the southern coast. Sukarno, ordering his men to move inland - and begin guerrilla warfare. The Dutch hoping to pin the paratroopers against the sea; and - wipe out their beachhead.

A Dutch spokesman in Hollandia says the situation is already under control.

SALAN

DeGaulle's former comrade-in-arms -- may have a harder time than Petain. The aged Marshal was able to gain clemency - because no one could prove that he was a pro-Nazi during the Nazi occupation of France. But there is no such ambiguity - about the prosecution of Salan. Everyone knows that he deliberately slipped out of France into Spain - and then across the Mediterranean to Algeria. When the abortive rebellion against DeGaulle collapsed - Salan escaped into the underground, where he became the leader of OAS terrorism. It didn't take long for a Paris court - to sentence

Salan's second in command, General Jouhaud, to death. It probably won't take any longer - to find Salan just as guilty.

ALGERIA FOLLOW SALAN

Meanwhile, there is fear in France and Algeria - that Salan's organization may be achieving its primary purpose. As we know, the OAS set to goad the Moslems of Algeria into a counter-attack; bring on full scale civil war. The OAS logic, being - that the French <u>army</u> then would <u>have</u> to intervene on the side of the European settlers.

Some Moslems, unable to restrain themselves any longer, have started shooting Europeans indiscriminately - in retaliation. So Algeria may be spiraling towards homicidal anarchy - which is what the OAS wants, in preference to an Algerian Algeria. Meanwhile high commissioner Fouchet has ordered all Moslems and Europeans - to stay in their own quarters.

PHILIPPINES

One of the more implausible disputes in the world concerns the United States and the Philippines. That question of compensation for damage - during the American administration of the island. The sum - seventy-three million dollars. The bill, as you probably know - was defeated in the House. Whereupon, President Macapagal - postponed his visit to this country.

Today, President Kenedy sent a special statement to Manila - about the new bill that is going to be introduced on Capitol Hill. Mr. Kennedy, expressing the hope - that the traditional ties between the two nations will not be damaged. Allies in war, friends in peace - the United States and the Philippines.

ANNAPOLIS

The new head of the United States Naval Academy worked his way up from the bottom. Charles Kirkpatrick joined the Navy as an enlisted man - thirty-six years ago. He served a year aboard ship - before simpling an appointment to Annapolis. After graduation, he rose through the grades - with almost unprecedented speed. Winning three Navy Crosses as a submarine commander - during World War Two. Later, serving on the staff of - Commander-in-Chief Ernest King. After the war, he made his mark as an administrative officer - and teacher of naval science.

Now, receiving - one of the Navy's most coveted appointments. Admiral Kirkpatrick, at the age of fifty-four --Superintendent of the Midshipmen at Annapolis.

NAMES

I wonder if you've ever heard this question - which has always been a favorite at charade parties? "When is China close to Denmark - Naples close to Poland - Sweden close to Peru?"

Answer - when they are all in the state of Maine. Down East, they've always had a penchant for - naming towns after foreign nations and cities. In fact, one crossroad sign at Albany, Maine - mentions nine different places abroad.

That's how the subject - gets into the news tonight. The sign has been stolen - for the fourth time in ten years. Evidently an attraction for souvenir hunters - because it tells how to get in a few minutes from China to Denmark.

HARVARD
