Massacre. Another massacre -- reported today from the Congo. At least ten white hostiges killed at the city of Bute, North of Stanleyville. So announced by the government, at Leopoldville.

From white mercenaries at the scene come unconfirmed reports that as many as Forty hostages -- may have been brutally slain by the rebels; their bodies -- thrown into the River Ruby. Sixty other white hostages are said to have been carried off by rebels as they fled before the government troops.

Adding, however, that "national debate" does not mean "national division". Our nation said he is now and will ram committed to the defense of freedom throughout the world.

## DOMINCAN FOLLOW PRESIDENT
