Thousands of U-S Marines have landed in Vies

Nam from the American Seventh Fleet to join South

Vietnamese troops in closing a trap on a Diet Cong
regiment near Dan Sang. An estimated fifieen-hundred

Communists are believed to be in the trap which was sprung
in the largest amphibious operation the Marines have
carried out in the war. Heavy fighting is reported raging
about twenty miles south of Da Vang, site of a big U-S air
base. The American and South Vietnamese forces have the Communists caught in rough triangle. One Marine officer
said "the only way the enemy has to go is up Highway One-and the Air Force would just love that."

## PLANE

The Air Force is getting a new plane -- authorized today by President Johnson, who okayed thépurchase of two hundred and ten new flexibile-wing bombers, called the FB-111 -- as replacements of $B-\zeta 2 ' s$ and $B-58 ' s$ being cut back in Defense Secretary McNamara's economy program.
(AFL-CIO President George Meany today ordered 50 anti-war demonstrators to be cleared from the balcony at the labor federation's convention in San Francisco. The demonstrators -- sponsored by a

San Francisco State College student committee -- held placards protesting the Vietnamese War while Secretary of State Dean Rusk was addressing the convention. He told the union leaders there is NO basis for peace at this time, despite erect diplomatic contacts with North Diet Nam.

## ALABAMA

01d History repeated itself in the south today -- an all-
white jury in Selma Alabama taking just ninety minutes to
free three white men they found innocent of guilt in the
fatal beating of the Reverend James Reeb, a Boston minister
and Civil Rights worker. There were fifteen whites in the courtroom who applauded -- and one hundred negroes who
groaned. Tonights verdict did NOT follow the pattern of recent verdicts in Alabama which on two occasions found white men guilty of Civil Rights crimes.

James Lovell are soaring through space, heading toward the midway point of their fourteen-day journey. As of six P. M.Eastern Standard Time -- they had been in space six days, three-and-a-half hours. Ninety-two orbits completed -with one-hundred-fourteen more trips around the world to go. Today was their busiest day on board the spaceship so far.

They coped with hoarseness, dry noses, minor problems in fuel cells, and experiments that had trouble coming off.

Command pilot Burman, speaking by radio to Mission control, said: "I feel like I was born up here." And he added --
"I feel fine -- a little sleepy --but Lovell is bouncing all over the place." Meantime Alt Cape Kennedy, Gemini-Six

Astronauts Walter Schirra and Thomas Stafford are all set for their blastoff to carry out a historic space rendezvous with the Gemini-Seven. They are scheduled to take off at 9:54 A-M - Eastern Standard Time--this Sunday. If all goes as planned, they will rendezvous with Borman and Lovell on

Sunday afternoon, five hours and forty minutes later. The two ships will perhaps be only inches apart. The GeminiSix spacecraft is pronounced in "go" condition-- and the Weather Man says the outlook is good.

Four crewmen on board the aircraft carrier Watts
"Wop" have been flown from the Atlantic to the United States mainland because they are suspected of having tuberculosis. But the outbreak of the disease is NOT expected to affect the carrier's role as the recovery ship for Gemini-Six and Seven. Medical officers say the outbreak could NOT be described as being "anything like an epidemic."

## COSMOS

C Russia today launched the ninety-ninth in its
series of unmanned Cosmos experimental satellites.

As usual, the Tass News Agency said the Cosmos is carrying "scientific instruments" for continued space research.

In Washington, the State Department said Russia has assured the United States that it will continue to abide by a United Nations resolution against sending weapons of mass destruction into outer space

The Air Force and a group of astronomers have decided that the "fireball", which streaked across the sky over the United States andCanada last night, was a large meteor -- which probably burned up in the earth's atmosphere

The fiery display was like a salute from the Heavens for America's Gemini astronauts --but it was too far north for them to see it. The fireball was sighted in at least ten states from coast to coast and as far south as Virginia.

A violent winter storm is threatening to flood
the British Houses of Parliament, with high tides sending the River Thames to within eight inches of the building.

All employees have been evacuated from the basement
rooms. The storm is also raking the Atlantic with gales,
whipping up mountainous waves which threaten to capsize
or sink the Greek Freighter "Costantis" off Ireland with
twenty-seven men aboard. The crew is clinging to the flooded ship as it wallows in heavy seas. France and Holland are also feeling the brunt of the storm. Six persons are known dead.

India and the United States have signed an
agreement for the shipment of a MILLION-and-a-half tons of American grain to help meet the food crisis in droughtstricken India. Speaking in the Indian Parliament, Premier Shastri expressed his sincerest thanks to President Johnson for going along with the new program. The grains, valued at nearly eighty-eight MILLION dollars, could start reaching India within six weeks. At the same time, Premier Shastri announced that he will go to Washington to meet with President Johnson on February First. Shastri said the talks would lead to a closer understanding between "our two countries and to a better appreciation of each other's points of view." There's no word on how long Shastri will stay in the United States.

could not be returned until sometime next year, because it
was being transferred from place to place in order to be "blessed."
