The pursuit of peace - driving force in a series of fast-break developments today - around the world.

In Washington - President Johnson agreeing to attend a major conference on our Asian allies - in Manila next month. Purpose -to "review prospects - for an honorable peace in southeast Asia."

Meanwhile, in Rome - Pope Paul dispatching
a personal envoy to Viet Nam. Archbishop Sergio Pegnedoli
a ssigned the job of mobilizing the Catholic hierarchy of
Viet Nam - in full support of the Pope's crusade of prayer
for peace - planned for next month.

Perhaps the he best news of all - from Peking.

Red China's foreign minister Chen Yi, quoted as frankly admitting - that China does not have the military power to ata attack the United Marko States. Chen Yi, adding his own personal conviction - that the U S really and truly does not want war - with Red China.

For all the talk of peace - everything but peace in Viet Nam. Missile-firing U S Navy jets - today blasting a North Vietnamese patrol boat from the South China Sea. While big American B-fifty-two's were hammering away - at the southern fringes of that supposedly demilitarized zone, Ata Attempting to head-off -- an exepcted major ax Communication monsoon offensive.

Mean fruit, in Saigon - South Vietnamese officials are reported pressing members of the International Control Commission - charged with policing the No man's Land, in hopes of getting a full-scale investigation - of the alleged manifest build-up there.

Indian and Canadian delegates to the Commission
- said to be willing. But the delegate from Communist

Poland - refusing to give in.

Back in Washington - a later appraisal of the peace effort - from visiting West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard. To the effect that the West must reach a "common evaluation" of Communist goals -- "if we are ever to achieve a kack lasting peace."

that that the choice lies between knuckling under - or fighting Communism. "In reality -- he went on "the alternative lies in tenacious negotiations - which balance reciprocal interests against each other."

President Johnson and Chancellor Erhard thereupon flyin g to Florida; for a tour of the U S
spaceport - at Cape Kennedy.

UNITED NATIONS

Nations - Indonesia will resume full participation in the world body -- starting km tomorrow. The timing - announced today by xmm by a U N official, who said that green General Assembly President Abdul Rahman Pazhawk of Afghanistan - will officially welcome back the Indonesian delegation - at the start of the morning session.

Earlier - Albania and Cambodia had threatened stiff opposition - to Indonesia's planned return. But in view of today's grox announcement - their objections apparently withdrawn -- or over-ruled.

The United States was accused today - of breaking the rules of the world monetary game by basing its economic policies on the American dollar - instead of gold.

This according to French Finance Minister Michael Debre - in a speech to a Washington meeting of the International Monetary Fund and world bank.

DeBre promising continued French cooperation on international money problems. Asserting, however,
that France has no intention - of supporting "paper gold"
as he put it.

"Paper gold" - by French definition - no American dollars or another other form of national currency; Support of which - said DeBre - can only lead to "worldwide inflation!"

The island of Guadeloupe in the West Indies world-famous for rum and perfume - first victim today
of Hurricane Inez. The newborn storm smashing into the
tiny French possession - packing winds up to a hundred
and twenty miles an hour. Thousands of coastal residents taking refuge in the hills minifested killer storm Cleo - me
that claimed the lives of fourteen islanders just two
years ago.

The nearby islands of Montserrat and Antigua next in line for a beating from Mighty Inez. As the
hurricane heads westward - at about twelve miles an kxxxxx.
hour - on its present course - a potential threat to
Puerto Rico - and the Virgin Islands, as well.

In Detroit - Chrysler joined Ford today - in rolling back announced price increases on new Nin eteen Sixty-Seven cars. A move enabling them to remain competitive - with the giant of the industry - General Motors.

In at least two lines - Ford and Chrysler paring their figures - below the G M level. Even so - Chrysler prices will average about sixty-eight dollars - over last year; Ford prices - about sixty-six, dollars - As compared with an average increase of only fifty-six dollars - at General Motors.

For both Chrysler and Ford - some of the xxx reduction, achieved by switching certain items; from standard equipment -- to optional, equipment. The rest, however, a clear-cut rollback - in base prices.

American Motors - which will soon announced its own new prices - expected to fall right in line,

The new government of Ghana today accused

Cuba - of interfering in Ghana's internal after affairs.

As a result ordering immediate closing - of the Cuban

Embassy at Accra.

Ghana declaring that since the ouster of

Kwame Nkrumah -- the new regime had done everything

possible - to maintain friendly relations with Cuba.

Adding, however, that"this gesture of friendship - has

not been reciprocated by Cuba."

Unofficially - Ghanaian sources noting that the last Cuban Ambassador - had been a close friend of the ousted Nkrumah.

Another computer is reported today - in the rarefied air of executive recruiting. Two high-priced New York employment agencies - announcing the installation of automatic electronic equipment, to be used in matching job-seeking executives - with available positions most suited to their abilities.

Outstanding characteristic of both plans - is that they greatly reduce the fees for finding a job.

Eliminating in the twinkling of an electronic eye - the old-time consuming method of matching job seekers with employers; often - mainly through memory.

One of the firms - even offering to supply

that the job information to interested applicants - on a

continuing basis; at a fee - of fifty dollars

a year.

They call it "job insurance; against the perils of mergers, acquisitions, sudden technological chances - and other career hazards."

A somewhat related item - from Hofstra University on Long Island. Site of an experimental program for reta retraining the mature, college-trained woman - who wants to return to the labor market.

Hofstra reporting a flood of applicants - for its so-called "career horizons" program. Winx With demand for services of the women, 4 after retrained, 4 fully as big or bigger than the supply. Tremendous opportunities for women - they say; in government - in professions related to medicine, such as occupational and physical therapy - in service fields - the teaching, in recreation, you name it.

As for the women themselves - why do they want to return to work? Some - to such supplement family income. Others - seeking "fulfillment" in the business world - now that their children are all grown up. Still others - because they know that some day they may have to work.

"Let's face it" - says a university official,

"they realize the statistics they're preparing for

widowhood."

On the brighter side - a bittersweet story of love and romance - that comes today from Vienna. A woman by the name of Anna Poechlinger Gruber - remarrying her first husband - Otto Poechlinger; with full approval of her second husband - Johann Gruber. And though there was never a divorce - it was all prefectly legal.

The whole affair - one of those amazing quirks of fate. Otto fighting for Austria on the eastern front-when he was captured by the Russians in Nineteen Forty-Five. Anna's letters to her husband later returned -marked "deceased". And after years of mourning - she finally married Johann - an old friend of the family.

The marraige a happy one - until Otto suddenly returned home last week; at age sixty -- free at last after twenty-one years of captivity. With Johann's blessing - Anna quickly returning to the arms of her true love.

Johann one of the first - to toast the newlyweds.

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Later - tears in his eyes - he as explained why. "I understand Anna" - said he - "and she really belongs to Otto."
