

INTEGRATION

L.T. - Olds. Mon. Nov. 14 - '60,

The integration of two New Orleans public schools took place <sup>today</sup> in an explosive atmosphere. The school board bowed to the ruling of a federal judge - who said ~~that~~ the classes must be integrated, one every year. But Governor Jimmy Davis made a campaign promise to go to jail - rather than integrate the schools. The Louisiana legislature ha<sup>d</sup> voted by big majorities - against integration. And today hostile crowds gathered at the McDonogh and William Frantz Grammar Schools. There was some talk - of preventing integration by force.

Then the U S Marshals arrived - escorting four ~~me~~ negro girls, each six years old. The principals insisted on opening the schools as usual - in spite of the demand by the Louisiana legislature that the whole state system be ~~sh~~ shut down for the day. As a result - the four little ~~girls~~ girls slipped into seats in the first grade classrooms, and broke the <sup>o</sup> color bar in the New Orleans public schools.

MEETING

The President elect and his defeated rival - will meet again in Washington, next month. This was ~~announced~~ announced by John Kennedy at his news conference - after a meeting with Vice President Nixon that lasted over an hour. They met at Nixon's vacation headquarters in Florida - and the Vice President later said he ~~is~~ was gratified that Kennedy had seen fit to call on him. What did the two statesmen talk about today?

He refused to go into ~~it~~ details - and parried a question

In Illinois, some Republicans have filed - for  
a recount. Led by Benjamin Adamowski - who claims that  
a recount will prove that he won the election as State  
attorney. He and his colleagues are also asking for a  
re-count ~~and~~ of the presidential vote. But the Democrats  
are saying - it works both ways. They think they'll pick  
up a lot of votes - should there be a recount.

Meanwhile, an absentee ballot has arrived in  
Newark, New Jersey - from Ed Robrecht in the Congo.

Robrecht apologizes because he couldn't have it notarized. There aren't any notaries left - in Stanleyville. But he sent his ~~xxx~~ absentee ballot anyway - and it's been duly accepted as the vote of a New Jersey resident. One ~~xx~~ vote for Nixon - from the Congo.



## LATIN AMERICA

Those abortive uprisings in Central America - appear to have ~~have~~ petered out tonight. The insurgents didn't receive enough support - to challenge the legitimate governments.

In Guatemala, President Ydigoras called off the air bombardment of enemy ~~xxxxx~~ positions - when it became clear that he had won. Ydigoras declared that he didn't want - any useless bloodshed; ~~termed~~ termed his opponents - "dreamers". And added - that they hadn't "tricked" enough of his army officers to give their rebellion any chance of success.

## NICARAGUA FOLLOW LATIN AMERICA

The rebels who tried to overthrow the government of Nicaragua - are hemmed in from two sides. They've been stopped - after their advance into Nicaragua, ~~And they're~~ <sup>are</sup> being ~~mopped up~~ <sup>harrassed</sup> in the rear - in Costa Rica, the base from which their drive was launched.

The key development today was - the surrender to the Nicaraguan army of a company of rebels besieged in a school, <sup>where the rebels</sup> ~~they~~ held two hundred children as hostages for several hours - before ~~he~~ deciding to give up. Then they ~~free~~ released the youngsters - unharmed, ~~And~~ came out of the school with their hands in the air.

One mystery in ~~the~~ Latin American disturbances - is the complicity of Fidel Castro. The Costarican ~~authorities~~ authorities announce they've captured documents - ~~it~~ linking the Cuban Dictator to the invasion of Nicaragua. But Castro's Ambassador - denies it.
