MIAMI BEACH

First stop - Secretary of State Dean Rusk; guest speaker today - at the continuing AFL-CIO Convention in Miami Beach. There declaring that the U.S. must be a nation to honor its commitments abroad - for our nation, said he - is the "principle pillar of peace" in today's world.

Those who would appease the North Vietnamese - those who never learn the lesson of Hitler - said Dean Rusk; they are the same people who said before World War II "let's give Hitler another bite and maybe he'll be satisfied."

"This time" - said the Secretary - "the world cannot afford such a mistake, "because" - in his words - "there wouldn't be enough left - from which to draw even a lesson."

More news from Vietnam - the story today of another

key allied victory. With American and South Vietnamese troops

- putting the capper on three days of battle, by crushing a

Viet Cong stronghold on the Bong Son Plain - about three

hundred miles north of Saigon.

In men alone - the enemy suffering a telling blow.

Casualty figures placing the number of Viet Cong dead - at more than two hundred and fifty, as compared with American losses - set at sixteen; South Vietnamese - also sixteen.

More than that - the defeat costing the Viet Cong control of the rice rich Bong Son flat lands without which - they will be hard put to find the food to fight on.

Meanwhile, in Saigon - U.S. officials were making

public a notebook - taken from a captured Viet Cong leader.

In it - the enemies latest "party line" saying, in effect, that

they Viet Cong are incapable of dealing allied forces any

"lethal blow"; and so they must consider a possible coalition

government - as a means to political if not military victory.

Here at home - renewed Senate debate today on Vietnam.

Including a speech by Senator Fulbright of Arkansas - to an almost empty Senate chamber; a speech in which the Senator called the Vietnamese war - "an immoral and unnecessary war" proving only America's willingness and ability to kill people - said he. The Senator going on to contend that it could have been avoided; but how - ah, he didn't say.

taking the Senate floor; to criticize the handling of a recent request by the Viet Cong - to send some representative to the United Nations; a request - that came to naught. "There is no excuse for this" - said Senator Mansfield. Adding: "We now witness once again a sorry specacle of who said what - who did what - who accepted or who refused - in the corridors backstage of the United Nations."

This followed shortly - by a long, carefully worded statement from the U.S. State Department. Asserting -first of all - that the United States does not oppose the presence of Viet Cong representatives at the United Nations: as long as "they are officially invited - for official business."

Adding, however, that "we do oppose their coming early to mount a propaganda campaign."

The statement further reaffirming U.S. opposition to any South Vietnamese coalition government - that would be - quote - "at variance" with the principle of self determination.

This perhaps in answer to that Viet Cong notebook - I mentioned a moment ago. In any case - a reassurance no doubt welcomed in Saigon

After five years of virtual stalemate - apparently a showdown at last in that Yemeni Gvil War, with Royalist forces swarming from the the hills today - laying seige to the Republican held - lofty, exotic walled-Capitol of Saana.

Royalist leaders telling the Republicans to surrender by tomorrow morning - "or be destroyed."

Even in advance of the deadline - Royalist gunners have been pounding the city; while Royalist ground troops have been seizing Saana's airport. In the process - capturing thirteen Republican army officers attempting to flee the country.

Stripped recently of Egyptian support - in the form of troops and equipment - the Republicans seemingly powerless to stem the Royalist tide, followers of the old Imam Yaya and his sons.

The month old regime of Republican President Iriany - still hangs by a thread, at last reports, with the President himself - now safely in Cairo.

The weekend weather outlook here in the states - a case of practically all bad - take your pick. The forecast including a snow storm in the Central Rockies - rain, hail and strong winds in the Northeast - with showers on tap from Pennsylvania to Alabama - plus more of the same along the West Coast from Canada to Mexico.
