The southern jaw of the trap consists of the American forces that broke out of the perimeter and are driving northward on the heels of the retreating Reds.

The news today shows the U.S. First Cavalry thrusting northward from the captured City of Vaegwan -- one max as much as unit driving parter five miles.

At the farthest corner south, however, the General bts are putting up a stubboan resistance and American troops are using flame throwers to rout them out of their holes.

It is morning in Lores n and South Korean troops are racing through the mountain area north of Taegu to complete the encirclement of two thousand Communists. On the Waktong River twenty-fourth Division bridgeheads have linked up in the Waggwan area, pushing forward nearly two miles on a five-mile front. The Reds are still falling back to the West and North. Theyere concentrating their forces at Kunwi, twenty-six miles north of Taegu. In the northeast corner of the perimeter a South Korean spearhead is driving northwest to cut the supply road at the port of Hunghae.

The weather forecast for Korea is good again this morning and all available planes have roared as out after retreating Communist troops along the Pusan purince perimeter. Pohang airstrip is expected in operation at any moment.

American diplomatic strategy went into action at the U. N. today - in an address made by Secretary of State Acheson. We proposed to the General Assembly that a program be set up for the reconstruction of Korea - the United Mations to assume the task of repairing the ravages of war, after the Communist invasion has been crushed.

He suggested what he called - a "recovery force". That is, a peaceful army for the rebuilding of Korea - which would include many of the engineers, technicians and medical experts now in the fighting forces of the U. N. The news dispatch calls this a - "revolutionary proposal." Which, indeed, it would seem to be - the world organisation, period sponsored military action against Red aggression, would then repair the damage.

The question comes immediately to mind - what about the Thirty-Eighth Parallel? What about Seviet-sponsored Korea above that line? Therest Today's

proposal by the American Secretary of State did not draw any distinction -- speaking merely of Korea, the war battered peninsula. We've all been asking - will the U. N. military forces push on above the Thirty-Eighth Parallel, when the Communist invasion is beaten? Will the Reds own territory be invaded? That, now, takes a new form - with today's Acheson proposal.

Would the U. M. reconstruction job extend north of the Thirty-Eighth Parallel? Would the work of benevolence and mercy be applied also to the home grounds of the Reds? We Know that North Korea has been blasted savagely by the B-29's - virtually all the industry wrecked.

But suppose the Soviets should say - no, we won't allow the U. H. to rebuild in the northern part of Korea. No American benevolence - in the Red puppet state. That could be awkward - keeing out all those U. N. benefits, the most of which would be supplied by Uncle Sam.

It reminds one of the MERKE Marshall & Plan a

few years ago, when Moscow prevented its own satellites
from accepting any of those billions of American dollars.
Some of the satellites felt bad about it - and the same
thing might happen again in the case of the North Koreans.

All of which might suggest that the Acheson proposal today, a based on humanity and international wisdom, might also have an angle of diplomatic shrewdness - tending to put Moscow in a hole. It will be interesting to hear - from Vishinsky.

In addition to this, the Secretary called for
a new method in the U. H. to keep the Soviet veto
from blocking action against future aggressions. Also
he made a suggestion on the subject of Formosa, saying
all interested parties shall have a full opportunity
to express their views. This was immediately taken to
be a hint that the Chinese heds might be invited to
express their views. - opening the door for the
Communities of China to participate in the debate.

Berlin's cold war has become distinctly warm today - with flaring tempers, kidnappings, and reprisals.

It started on Monday, when six Soviet German police drove into the American sector and were promptly arrested.

On Tuesday, east German police countered by arresting twenty-five western sector police riding on a train through eastern Berlin. Today western Berlin went one step better, rounding up forty-four east German police living in western Berlin.

Later today two American military police were seized by the Communists, near the U.S. Russian coeter border. The M. P.'s radiced that their jeep was being stopped by east German police - in the American sector. Then their radio went dead, and no more has been heard. The Russians say they'll investigate.
