(San Francisco)

Good Evening Everybody:

Since arriving in San Francisco yesterday
afternoon, of course $I$ have followed the usual routine,
visiting the big hotels, headquarters of candidates
and delegates. Not all of them. Some delegations are in obscure hotels where the rooms are not as expensive as they are at the Mark Hopkins, the Fairmont, St.

Francis and The Palace, The New Hilton, and so on. For instance, the Alaskan delegation which includes quite a number of Republicans who were practically wiped out by the recent earthquake, including Lowell Jr. who is to address the convention this evening - they are staying at a small hotel where rooms only cost them four dollars a day.

Everywhere I go people ask me the same questions: When was your first political convention?

When I tell them that it was in nineteen twelve in Chicago, when Teddy Roosevelt was nominated, they are a little shocked by that. Next question: Do you see any change in the Conventions? The answer -yes, in a way they are just as exciting as ever. But as a result of radio, and especially television, they are
quieter, gradually becoming toned down, fewer seconding speeches, much less flamboyant oratory -- a change for the better.

One phrase that you hear over and over at
this Convention is likely to go down in political history

Namely - "The Scranton Letter". The message that

William Scranton sent to Barry Goldwater. Scranton,
declaring that the GOP is fighting for its soul.

Fighting against - Goldwaterism. And going on to
castigate his opponent fir a number of dangerous
positions - including nuclear irresponsibility.

If Scranton was trying to anger Goldwater -
he succeeded. The Arizonian is frankly "boiling mad".

Not, he insists because of the attack on him, but
because of the damage to the party. So at the moment
it already is a celebrated document, the Scranton
letter.

When Senator Goldwater visited former President
Eisenhower, they discussed "nothing substantive" at all.
The phrase is - General Ike's, and puts an end to the speculation about a basic political discussion between our last Republican President and the man who hopes to be our next Republican President. Just a social visit according to Mr. Eisenhower.

As for the Republican platform - he has some
ideas about that. For one thing, he favors - strengthening
the Civil Rights plank by calling on all Americans - to accept the moral imperative against discrimination.

## But General Eisenhower disagrees with the

Governor Scranton proposal for a plank - demanding

Presidential control of nuclear weapons. Ike feels
that the present authority - must be maintained. But he opposes in his words, "writing tactical decisions into the platform."

The advice of a man - who has made quite a few tactical decisions in his time.

The former President gave his views on extremist political
groups today at a news conference shortly after the twonti-eighth Republican

Shtional Convention got under may.

Governor Scranton, fighting a last ditch battle to stop Senator Goldwater, wants the party platform to carry a plank denouncing extremist groups of the right or left. And Scranton forces have specifically nased the John Birch Society as one group the 00 P should condean.

A reporter asked Cenaral Eisenhower if he favored a plank
nading the Birch Society, He replied that he did not favor mention of any group by name. But he vent on to say that mextivemists are wrong - always wronge" The former President added that the leader of the Birch society, Bobert Welch, had mmade many statements that were nothing short of character agsagsination." Such statements had been made about many persons "including m, said Ike.

It's interesting how the European press, both right and left wing - seems so disturbed by events out here in San Francisco. The most common these being that/ Goldwater nomination would be a disaster that would ruin the Republican party. Now how would they know?

Even the usually unflappable Times of London talks about the GOP's apparent intention of destroying itself in full view of the nation as it sits before its tel vision sets and of course in full view of the horrified and unbelieving foreign press. So says the Times of London.

Now, who would you say - is the world's number one capitalist? According to Mao Ts Ting the answer is - Nikita Khrushchev. Mao, chawing that the boss of the Kremlin is a "phoney communist - who wants to return Capitalism to Russia. For example by adding Wester style incentives to the Soviet economy.
