Good evening. At San Francisco - at last - a

tentative agreement today in that four-month-long West Coast

dock strike. Terms not disclosed. However, union and

management negotiators - announced that all economic issues

have now been settled. Adding that "certain non-economic

issues - will be mediated and, if necessary, arbitrated."

All this - subject, of course, to ratification by the dockworkers' full membership. Observers predicted though - speedy approval. And so ends, it seems - one of the costliest strikes in American history; in terms of foreign trade - one that may have caused irreparable damage.

But despite that tentative agreement - the Senate late in the day moved quickly - and strongly - to approve a plan of compulsory arbitration to settle the walkout - if necessary. The vote was seventy-nine to three -with only three Senators voting against it - two Democrats - Proxmire of Wisconsin - Harris of Oklahoma - and one Republican Weicker of Connecticut.

The measure provides for termination of arbitration proceedings - any time a voluntary settlement is formally certified. It now goes to the House - for doubtful reception.

WHITE HOUSE

Word from the White House that President Nixon - will make a live nationwide radio broadcast tomorrow morning - on the general subject of Foreign Policy. It's in connection with a voluminous Foreign-Policy report he's sending to Congress - setting forth his view of the state of the world - at the end of his third year in office.

The President will speak from his oval office in the White House tomorrow morning - starting at six minutes after eleven - Eastern Time. The speech to be heard live over these CBS network radio stations.

Also from the White House - a gift to the nation today.

President Nixon turned over to state and local governments

- twenty parcels of Federal land worth four-and-ashalf million.

These to be used for parks and recreational purposes - along with a previous gift of sixty-three such parcels just last year

The President also issued an executive order - which virtually bans the poisoning of eagles, hawks, coyotes, falcons and other predators. At the same time, he urged Congress to pass legislation - to protect these creatures from shooting and trapping as well; also, legislation aimed at identifying additional endangered species - before it's too late.

"Clean air and clean water - the wise useof our land

- the protection of wildlife and natural beauty - parks for

all to enjoy - these" - said the President - "are part of the

birthright of every American." But "to guarantee that

birthright" - he continued - "we must act and act decisively;

- saying - it is literally - now or never."

Secretary John Chafee turned down the applications of two young women - for admission to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis. Chafee explained the manpower needs of ships at sea - currently demand "every bit of output" the Academy can provide.

However, the Secretary also announced plans to open a coed Naval ROTC program at Jacksonville University; with other schools - soon to follow. Chafee observing that "maybe somewhere down the road" - girls will be admitted to Annapolis; but for now - said he - "we hope they'll go into the ROTC program, instead."

As everyone knows - the mills of Congress normally grind exceeding slow; but this year - slower than ever.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield observing today; "It's been a lousy January and a lousy February." And the main reason - said he - rampant Senate absenteeism.

Everest right there in front of you, along with Lhotse and a dozen more of those mighty Himalayan peaks. And the season from October to May. Oh yes, you can fly there by helicopter. Almost everything used in the construction of this hotel was carried in by sherpa guidex porters, or by helicopters. Would you say it might be a bit startling to wake up in the morning and look over and see your wife on the other pillow wearing an oxygen mask? How about making a reservation, Warren?
