

TRIESTE

This after, the United States and Great Britian today declared - they are getting out of Trieste! Taking their soldiers out "at the earliest practicable date." And leaving "Zone A" to the Italians.

The disputed area at the Adriatic city is divided into two zones, of which "A" includes the great port of Trieste, and the territory around it. This - occupied by the Allies. "Zone B" - the more outlying parts of the Province of Istria. Which was turned over to the Yugoslavs.

4 Recently, the Italians demanded a plebiscite in the whole Trieste area - both zones. Let the people decide. The Yugoslavs rejected this, angrily.

Great Britain and the United States have tried repeatedly to arrange some sort of accommodation. But - no go. So now - the two countries are simply getting out. Handing their area - over to the Italians. Leaving the question to be decided by negotiations - between Italy and Yugoslavia. London ----

and Washington say ~~XXXX~~ hopefully, they trust that the two countries will make ~~an~~ a peaceable arrangement.

In Rome - the government of Premier Pella goes into emergency session. There are expressions of satisfaction - that the "zone A" is turned over to Italy. But there's disgruntlement ^{too -} because the Italians want both zones.

In Yugoslavia - angry demonstrations. Crowds marching through the streets - shouting protests. Press and radio, controlled by Communist Marshal Tito, are blaring with bitter comment. But it remains to be seen what Tito's government will do officially - following the sudden British-American move. →

ATOMIC

President Eisenhower has ordered all government officials to keep quiet about atomic bomb developments in Soviet Russia. Mum is the word - unless they check with the Atomic Energy Commission.

This follows ^A contradictory statements about a Soviet H-bomb -- top level officials talking at cross purposes, And - creating a good deal of confusion.

Now, ~~xxx~~ that's ended, President Eisenhower having the final say - In these words: "The Soviets now have the capability of atomic attack on us, and such capability will increase with the passage of time." →

FOLLOW ATOMIC

Tonight, an atomic expert is quoted as saying that the radiation from an A bomb is not - a "serious killer".

Captain H. C. Kinne, in charge of technical training at the Sandia Army Special Weapons base, in New Mexico, declared ^{that} "a minute and a half after you see the white light of the blast, the radiation hazard on the ground is over." Adding - that scientists now realize that only a small percentage of the people killed at Hiroshima were victims of radiation.

He said he was making the statement to correct a mass of mis-information.

TURKEY

In Paris, General Gruenther's headquarters announces the establishment of a U S Air Force Base in Turkey - within easy striking distance of the great Soviet oil fields in the Caucasus. There, the Sixth tactical Air Force will be stationed - consisting of jet bombers and fighters, together with propeller driven planes. This U S Air Force base, in Turkey, will go into operation October fourteenth - next week.

Perhaps, the American base, where U S authorities maintain a special camp for deserters from the military forces of the Soviets.

VIENNA

The compounds maintain a constant inter-communication by bow and arrow.

Mixed in with all that, they raise an unholy bedlam - chanting and yelling, beating on drums. The Indian commander says the uproar wakes him up - although - he sleeps a quarter of a mile away.

The U P reporter says: "The strain on the Indian soldiers is terrific." They pace nervously; look this way and that, never knowing what kind of explosion may erupt. The reporter calls it on bedeviling job - lo, the poor Indian!

FORMOSA

There was a big reception on the island of Formosa, today - when a band of escaped prisoners of war arrived. Sixty-three Chinese, who got away - when Syngman Rhee staged the spectacular liberation of anti-Communist prisoners.

They tell how, when the South Koreans opened the camps, they made their way to Pusan - and there were sheltered and concealed by Chinese living in the city. Finally, when the hubbub ended, arrangements were made to fly them to Formosa. Where they arrived today - to join Chiang Kai-Shek's army.

Several of them told American reporters that they joined the Chinese Communist army, because they were starving, and that was the only way they could stay alive. Sent to the battlefield, they took the first opportunity to ~~XXXX~~ surrender.

JAPAN

The U S government, we hear, is preparing a multi-million dollar program of military aid - for Japan. To hasten -- the rebuilding of the armed forces of our recent enemy.

Right now, a personal envoy of Tokyo Prime Minister Yoshida is in Washington. Presenting a plan - to start a new Japanese army with a force of two hundred thousand soldiers. An Air Force - beginning with a thousand planes. A Navy - one-hundred-and-fifty-thousand tons of smaller warships.

SECRETARY

Almost as much of a surprise as that former nomination of Martin Durkin of the A F of L who quit as Secretary of Labor - charging that President Eisenhower backed down on policies of Taft-Hartley law revision.

KIDNAP

The F.B.I. is convinced that the child, Bobby Greenlease, was killed by Carl Hall, the black sheep of a wealthy family - who engineered the kidnapping. That Hall is merely trying to put the blame on Marsh, a drunken derelict.

This based on contradictions in the story told by Hall, and on statements made by the Heady woman, who took the six year old boy from the school he was attending. She says she saw a bundle in Hall's own station wagon - corresponding to the way the child's body was bundled, when buried.

Mrs. Heady claims that she never knew it was a kidnap-ransom crime, and Hall says - she didn't know of the six hundred thousand dollars he demanded and collected. But the police, apparently, have found her finger prints on the ransom notes.

Today, in Washington, Attorney General Brownell stated that the F B I would turn over the two prisoners to the state of Missouri, for trial. Missouri law providing the death penalty for kidnapping - and for murder.

FOLLOW KIDNAP

GENERAL CLARK
