Only trouble -- the Army at first assigned him to Germany. Albert Hamburg was forced to file an appeal -- and that led to a newspaperarticle and that led Army officials eventually to his true identity.

The full story just coming to light -- with Hamburg's written request to the American civil Liberties Union.
