PRESIDENT

President Nixon sent Congress today a message dealing with unemployment compensation. In it making a concession to the recent demands of organized labor. The President urging an amendment to existing law - specifying that "every eligible insured worker, when unemployed, must be paid a benefit equal to at least fifty percent of his average weekly wage." Also, urging broader coverage to include migrant farm workers, and said he - "especially for those who need unemployment protection."

The President going on to note - that a record eighty three point nine million Americans now have jobs - adding, however, "a sunny day - remains the best time of day to fix a leaky roof." "This legislation would bring gænuine improvement - he continued - "in the lives of millions of those on whom the nation depends most heavily - our working men and women."

WATERGATE

Elsewhere in Washington - a Federal grand jury was continuing its investigation into the Watergate affair but moving its hearings to more secluded quarters - the better to protect the anonymity of future witnesses. At the same time former Attorney General John Mitchell again denies that he was in any way implicated in the Watergate incident. Lest there be any doubt Mitchell flatly asserting: "If I had known about Watergate I would have stopped it."

PENTAGON

From the Pentagon - a brief announcement today; spelling the end of the line for the families of American service men - still listed as missing in action. Dr. Roger Shields of the Pentagon's P O W task force saying: "We have no indication at this moment that there are any Americans alive in Indo China. "

Dr. Shields adding that today's statement was aimed at refuting rumors that hundreds of Americans are still being held in Laos. Such rumors, said he - can only "do the families of the missing a dis-service."

BEIRUT

In the Middle East - Beirut - Arab passions were again running rampant today. Tens of thousands of mourners - joining a funeral procession for three guerrilla leaders and six other Palestinians - all of whom were killed - as you know - by Israeli raiders. The mourners interspersing their tears with cries for **Wash** retalliation. Shouting over and over: "With blood, we shall revenge you."

Similar demonstrations - with Anti-U S overtones were also held today in Damascus, Kuwait, Alexandria and Cairo. The latter featuring cries such as: Arab people - sweep away and destroy American interests." STATE

Here at home - an angry response. The U S State Department categorically denying any part in the Beirut attack. Further charging"a deliberate **series** anti-American campaign by the Fedayen - using the old technique of the big lie.," in the hope "that if they make the lie big enough and repeat it often enough - eventually people come to believe it."

Spokesman Charles Bray also criticizing Arab governments for picking up and repeating guerrilla charges in their own official broadcasts. Before giving credence to these irresponsible and completely false charges - said he - "others in the area should reflect not only on our repeated unequivocal denials but on the possible consequences of lending further credence to these lies."
