Like - the "Pieta". What a thrill, after all the discussion - to see Michelangelo's masterpiece in the Vatican pavilion. Maybe you would prefer - the replica of the "Bounty". Or - the Sudanese Mosque.

Or - the Lincoln display in the Illinois pavilion. The list - is endless. Of course the General Motors building should be high on your list.

As for the overall impression - this World's

Fair seems to place greater emphasis on knowledge
less on mere amusement. Conspiczuously absent - the

old carnival spirit. Robert Moses, making only one concession. There are - hula girls. Authentic

Hawaiian hula girls - representing our fiftieth

state. In all there are - one hundred and thirty-four
pavilions. Also one hundred and thirteen restaurants,

forty-three - bars and cocktail lounges. Countlesshot dog stands, and so on.

Advance ticket sale - thirty-five million.

With the possibility - in fact probability, of one hundred million - before this World's Fair ends.

JOHNSON FOLLOW FAIR

One of the main attractions today at the World's Fair was the President of the United States.

Lyndon Johnson, flying in from Washington - to open it with a Presidential flourish. Also on hand - former President Truman, Mayor Wagner, Adlai Stevenson, Ralph Bunche, nine state governors, twenty-three Ambassadors, not to mention more than two thousand guards - including the F.B.I. and Pinkertons.

President Johnson's theme - "the present as a guide to the future! Or, in a phrase that we used to hear all the time - "the world of tomorrow."

What - will that world be like? President

Johnson referred to the motto of the Fair - "Peace

through Understanding." Tellinghis audience - that

peace will be kept, and that the result will be
freedom from fear and prejudice.

DEMONSTRATION FOLLOW JOHNSON

The President's reference to freemom came while a group of hecklers were shouting - "Freedom now!" Mr. Johnson, reminding them that America has done more than any other nation - to correct its shortcomings. And, that we are working toward a - nation based on equality.

Actually, the demonstration at and around the World's Fair - was much smaller than its leaders predicted. The stall-in - which was supposed to create a mammoth traffic jam - fizzled out. Subways not seriously disrupted - in spite of a few scuffles between demonstrators and police, some arrests.

Inside the Fair grounds -little disorder.

James Farmer lead a none-violent Core demonstration
and was arrested.

A major question about the New York stell-in concerns its effect on Capitol Hill. Will it hurt - the Civil Rights Bill? Perhaps alienate enough Senators - to defeat the measure?

Senator Curtis of Mebraska believes that it

won't affect the vote - one way or the other. No

lawmaker, changing his mind - because of this

demonstration. But the Nebraska Republican predicts

that a distinct "backlash" will be felt - in the future,

When the voters get a chance to express themselves
in the polling booth.

Senator Curtis, warning about an increase in the number of segregationists on Capitol Hill - if there are many more of these wildcat demonstrations.

The birthday greetings that Mao Tse-tung sent evidently to Khrushchev - well, they didn't fool the Boss of the Kremlin. Whrushchev has indulged in sly propaganda often enough - to recognize it when it appears on his desk. And he's not beaming - but snarling - over that billet doux from Peking, The one in which Mao spoke of the Chinese-Russian differences - as "temporary."

Today Ahrushchev termed the greetings
"hypocritical". And applauded of a Kremlin speaker, to

castigated the Strongman of Red China, Terming Mao

"a fraud, a maniac - an absurd living Buddha."

This, an obvious retort to the Chinese Reds, who have scalled Khrushchev - "a psalm-singing, Bible-reading buffoon." In other words, the hostility between Russia and Red China - is becoming personal. No longer any euphemisms of weak language covering insults and

challenges. Khrushchev and Mao are now toe-to-toe in the center of the ring - and slugging it out.
