KHABAROVSK

How would you like to spend a holiday in a city of a half a million people where every day is like Sunday in Philadelphia? If so $I$ suggest you spend your vacation in Khabarovsk, in far eastern Siberia - on the Amur River. From its spelling you would think it would be pronounced Kab-ar-ovsk. But the citizens of that city which not many travellers ever see, they pronounce it Hab-ar-ovsk! An impressive city with so little vehicular traffic on the streets that you can stroll down the middle of the street. Of course it will not be quiet if the chinese on the Amur River started shooting again. But the Russians in Khaharovsk - most of the inhabitants are transplanted Russians - shrug their shoulders and say they are not worried about the Chinese "over there." The Amur is so wide at Khabarovsk that you cant see Chinese on the other bank, even with binoculars.

The first thing our Russian hosts did was rush us through customs without any formalities, put us in a bus and

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drive us to a dock where we were put aboard a river steamer
for a one hour trip up and down the Amur for a panoramic view of Khabarovsk.

The weather was ideal, sunshine nearly all night long,
and we stopped for a few minutes to take a look at some ten
or maybe twenty thousand Russians in bikinis on a sandy

Amur River beach near the center of the city. Then, a
banquet, - which in Russia - I mean - Siberia, is an event!
one to remember if you survive all the caviar and vodka, and all the toasts.

On the streets you see many women in rough working
clothes; as you have seen them in pictures. Everywhere they
seem to have equal rights with the man. The mayor, a lady, made the welcoming speech, which is followed by toasts that went on and on into the night - after I had fled.

One of the things we noticed right away upon landing in Siberia, everywhere statues of Lenin or huge pictures of him. For we were arriving during the celebration of the One
