The choice apparently foretelling a strike against Ford at midnight Wednesday - when present contracts officially expire leaving Chrysler and General Motors free to continue production - while the UAW concentrates

That Arab summit moeting at Kharioum - finally and ended today; with at least a facade - of Arab unity. Arab leaders agreeing unanimously - to lift an oil embargo against the United States and other western nations. This **and** to be a first step ~ toward rebuilding their warshattered economies.

At the same time - a report today from London; that Egypt's Colonet Nasser has finally accepted a peace plan # already approved by the United States and Russia. This supposedly calling for Israel to return most of its captured territory -- in exchange for formal recognition from the Arab world. Leaving the status of Jerusalem and "certain border areas" - for later, detailed negotiations.

Even so Z at least one remaining flaw ** in the efforts to **xeffer** defuse the explosive Middle East. Yemeni Republican President Abdullah Al Sallal - today rejecting a peace plan put forward by Egypt and Saudi Arabia; as

a means of ending the five year old Yemeni Civil War $\frac{-\alpha}{n}$ in the name of Arab unity.

Sallal saying the agreement "in no way - binds the Yemeni people." Adding, in effect: "We of Yemen - shall determine our own fate."

VIETNAM

In Vietnam - a new day is dawning at this hour. oper there, It's already Saturday - in that part of the world. Which means the political oratory is over - the feuding silenced -

the campaign at an end.

Now comes the waiting - for Sunday's historic presidential election. And with it - a new wave of enemy terrorist activity. According to many Vietnamese - the worst in memory.

Biggest single incident: A mortar attack against U S Marine headquarters at Phu Bai- causing some **bigs** fifty casualties. Also a rocket barrage - against the big American Air Base at **fso** Da Nang. In addition - two American soldiers shot and wounded in Saigon - a bomb set off in a crowded restaurant in the Mekong Delta and hundreds of killings and kidnappings throughout the countryside. VIETNAM - 2

Still - the election preparations go on. With the Saigon government today distributing more than a thousand tons of ballots - by truck, plane and boat. While a delegation of American poll watchers were jame joining with observers from twenty-seven other countries to guard against irregularities.

Perhaps more to the point - an untold number of American and South Vietnamese troops, now in defensive position - around the country's nearly nine thousand polling stations. Hoping to prevent further terrorists attacks =

Hoping the election really free and make it a success.

WHITE HOUSE

Here in our own part of the world -- another L B J "special" today. At the White House -- the President calling an impromptu news conference; to deny emphatically any serious rift between U.S. civilian and military leaders -- over the bombing of North Vietnam.

The President's remarks -- in response to that Senate Preparedness Subcommittee report of yesterday, highly critical of the administration in general, for and Defense Secretary Robert McNamara in particular *+ for restricting military men in their choice of aerial targets.

The President asserting -- there have been honest differences; but these have been "blown all out of proportion" -- between Robert McNamara, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Secretary of State Dean Rusk -- White House. In fact -- said the President -- "I have never known a period when there was more harmony -- more general agreement -or a more cooperative attitude -- or more able men in control!

MOSCOW

Backlash in Moscow. The Kremlin today barring two American diplomats -- from further service in the Soviet Union. These -- Richard Chapman -- first secretary of the American Embassy in Moscow; also Brice Meeker -- U.S. Agricultural attache in Moscow. Both accused of activities --"incompatible with diplomatic status."

The U.S. State Department quickly denying though--that either man had been guilty of any misconduct. Calling the Kremlin move -- obvious retaliation for similar action against two Soviet diplomats; alleged Russian spies -- who were recently barred from the United States.

HIPPIES

Elsewhere in Moscow -- the Kremlin's controlling hand was also apparent today; in the conviction of three so-called "hippies of Moscow" -- for, quote, "disturbing the peace."

What did they do? They staged a sign-waving demonstration -- blocking traffic in Moscow's Gorky Street? as part of a protest -- against the imprisonment last year of Soviet writers Andrei Sinyavsky and Yuri Daniel.

And what did it get them? Three years in jail for Vladimir Bukovsky -- who machining the demonstration; A year's probation for Bukovsky's two co-defendents -- who

said they were merely fellow travelers.

The next--a modern tale of the South Pacific--yet a throwback to days of yesteryear. It's a story of latterday pirates and buccameers--who still infest the Sulu Sea in the southern Philippines.

Two or three times a week--the pirates come blezing out of the night in their long, lean "kumpips;" native boats-equipped with big outboard engines. Hijacking helpless seafarers--plundering remote villages--terrorizing local police; and easily outrunning the fastest boats in the Fhilippine Navy--whenever things get tight.

These pirates--Muslim cutthroats, for the most part. Many of them--originally smugglers, thieves and just plain rascals; but more of them simply following in the footsteps of their fathers--and their fathers fathers before them. Firates all--down through the ages; terrorizing shipping lanes--throughout the seven thousand Philippine Islands.

But now it appears -- their days may be numbered. With the government in Manila--under interesting pressure--to root out the pirates in their home lair and finish them off. page two xinitax sulu sea

a tough assignment -- to be sure; yet one that must be accomplished sconer or later -- if the Philippines are to achieve their true potential. A big slowdown in the sky -- the object of a new rule offered today by the Federal Aviation Administration; as a means of reducing aircraft collisions -- at congested lower altitudes.

As presently written -- the proposed rule would set a speed limit of two hundred-and-fifty knots -- or two hundred and-eighty-eight miles an hour; for any and all planes -flying below ten thousand feet. Purpose -- says the FAA: to "promote the safe separation of aircraft -- by giving pilots more time to see and avoid other planes."

This apparently the first concrete result -- of Congressional Air Safety Hearings; emphasizing the danger of "mixing" private and business planes -- with high-speed commercial jets. From a meeting of the American Psychological Association in Washington -- a prediction today of amazing days ahead; when science may be able -- literally -- to 'pick the brains" of our greatest men.

This according to Dr. David Krech -- based on recent studies at the University of California at Berkeley. Dr. Krech saying the time will probably come -- when memories recorded in one mind may be transplanted intact to another mind; in his own words -- "via injections of brain-extracts of nucleo-proteins -- or R.N.A." -- whatever that is.

Indeed, the doctor viewith a shudder ; as he

put it, 44 the day when men's minds may be completely re-stocked with brain injections. Why -- "with a shudder?" Because -- said Dr. Krech -- such manipulation would be "the final insult" to human freedom.

TUNIS

Found at last: a lost city -- perhaps a lost civilization -- dating back nearly two thousand years.
