ASTRONAUT

I hope you were listening to what went on in Washington today. If so you heard Astronaut Shepard say: "I thought last Friday was thrilling, but this surpasses it." Alan Shepard referring first - to his rocket ride into space and back; and then adding that today topped it - his welcome in the national capital.

First a crowd cheered him at Andrews Air Force base, in Maryland - when he flew in from the Bahamas. Then more of course were on hand as he **drawe** arrived by helicopter at the White House to receive the Distinguished Service Medal - from the President. It was exceedingly informal. Some thought too informal. At the White House, in the Rose Garden, there was a flash of the familiar Kennedy wit. The President fumbled the medal - and dropped it. On presenting it, he said to Astronaut Shepard - "This medal has gone from the ground up." Whereupon

the President made the easy-to-make error of handing over the medal - instead of pinning on Shepard's lapel. But, he quickly recovered with his usual aplomb, and with the words -

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"Let me pin it on! I'll do my deta " el a All of which drew a round of chuckles - from the crowd. Ageo from - the two Navy men

involved. That is, the President and the astronaut.

White House to the Capitol, More than a quarter of a million spectators - lining Pennsylvania Avenue, cheering themselves hoarse. Quite a thrill for - a thirty-seven year old Commander in the Navy, But no one thinks it was too much for - Americare estronaut. As one Washington policeman put it:- "This is the first time we've ever had a visitor from outer space."

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CONFERENCE FOLLOW ASTRONAUT

At his Washington news conference, astronaut Shepard was bombarded with questions - from a room-full of newsmen, and handled himself superby. For some of the points he made:-

First, he said he and his fellow astronauts feel - that we could have beater the Russians into space. At the same time, they are convinced that our Mercury project was "well thought out - reliable."

As for his blast-off from the launching pad - he says it surprised him, because it was so smooth. How did he feel - at that big moment? Didn't have time for personal feelings! "Too many technical things to think about."

Then the whole flight - went just as smoothly. No discomfort - even when his capsule began to move at eleven times the force of gavity. As for weightlessness he said he knew he'd be asked that question, and was

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ready for it. That during the five minutes of weightlessness - then and there he figured out his answer. "Quite a pleasant sensation;" that was all.

His remark about the beautiful view came - when he first looked through his periscope. His view along our coast over the Atlantic for some eight hundred miles; obscured in part - by clouds. The rest -"beautiful."

His general verdict - on his space flight? A perfect experiment - pointing toward the day when American astronauts will fly to the Moon and beyond. RUSK

CUBA

Cuban refugees in Miami say that Castro is stepping up his summary executions. The dictator, getting rid of his opponents - by quietly sending them before the firing squad. These reports indicate a wave of terror - across central Cuba. Castro's militiamen, rounding up suspects - hustling them off to jail. Then - the fixed trial, following quickly by the death penalty.

Which may Evidently this means that opposition to the Cuban dictator is increasing. Which could be what was in President Kennedy's mind when he informed the National Association of Broadcasters - that the story of Cuba "is not yet finally ended.

RECESSION

The anti-recession bill signed by President Kennedy today - involves two hundred million dollars. That much - for jobless families with children. The money, to be made available to the states - and passed on in the form of grants over the next fourteen months. The number affected - two hundred thousand parents, and half a million children.
