EISENHOWER - CONFERENCE

President Eisenhower met leaders of Congress today, Democrats and Republicans - and gave them a report on the Geneva conference. With Secretary of State John Foster Dulles beside him, the President had a session, lasting for an hour and a half, with the legislators.

He told them what, in his opinion, was the outstanding feature of that palaver at the "summit." And put it in these words: "It is apparently the sincere desire, expressed by the Soviet delegation, to discuss world problems in an atmosphere of friendliness."

To which the President added a caution. He called the new Russian attitude - "A hopeful development." But said it does not warrant any relaxation of defensive measures by the West.

The President and the Secretary of State gave the Congressional leaders one important assurance. Telling them -"no secret agreement has been made, nor have any private papers been initialed." In other words, no secret dealings - either directly or indirectly.

Having reported to Congress, the President will next make a similar report to the nation. On radio and television, ten-thirty, Eastern Standard Time, tonight, 9:30 Central Time, 8:30 for the mountain area; 7:30 for the Far West.

HOOVER

The news, today, was full of comment on the results of the Big Four affair at Geneva. Heading the list, out here on the West Coast - former President Herbert Hoover. Who, today, said that President Eisenhower achieved - "a master stroke". The former President - pointing to Eisenhower's challenge to the Soviet leaders. Suggesting - an exchange of military information between the United States and Russia. "The President's offer," said Herbert Hoover, "really has put the Russians in a spot, this time."

But he cautioned quickly - that neither this nor any other single maneuver would assure - a settlement of the cold war. "Peace," declared the former President, "can only be achieved slowly - a step by careful step."

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ADENKAUER

Chancellor Adenhauer will go to Moscow. So announced by the West German leader, today.

Several weeks ago the Soviets invited Adenhauer to pay them a visit - for the purpose of establishing normal Russian-German relations. The Chancellor postpened an answer. Saying - he would not mkme a decision, on a trip to Moscow, until after the Big Four conference at Geneva.

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Of course, at the Geneva conference, the heads of State made no decisions. The question or practical settlement - handed over to the Foreign Ministers of the Big Four, who will meet in October. But Adenhauer won't wait until they have completed their deliberations. Such a delay, says he, would be - "impolite." So, the visit Moscow, sometime between now and October.

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Meanwhile, a statement on German matters from Soviet leaders Bulganin and Krushchev - whc, today, were in Communist East Germany. Making a stop - on their way home from Geneva. To the East German Communists, they repeated what they had indicated in Geneva - Settlement of the German question must wait - until there is an all-around security arrangement with the West. Krushchev stating - that an agreement on Germany must come by way of discussions among the Germans themselves. That is - talks between satelite East Germany and the West German government. Which, however, runs into a refusal by the West German leaders & to deal with the puppet state. Declaring - that the Communist regime does not represent the people of East Germany.

Cut China, this time - following the big-time variey with when Bowlet protocology at Genera. The same city in Switzerland, will be the scene of the Grabbouing get-tegether - of American Minerigan Memory fold Featur Dullas and Chou En Let of Communist China.

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RED CHINA

There is to be a meeting between the United States and Red China - at the level of the Foreign Ministers. The purpose - to discuss the return of fifty-one Americans held by the Communists.

So now, we will have another East-West conference. Red China, this time - following the big-time parley with the Soviet at Geneva. The same city in Switzerland, will be the scene of the forthcoming get-together - of American American John Foster Dulles and Chou En Lai of Communist China.

The State Department in Washington recalls that, in the spring, Chou en Lai said - he was willing to have talks with the United States. The suggestion - followed up by India and Burma, sounding out both sides. The actual arrangements for the talks were made through the mediation of Great Britain which has diplomatic relations with Red China.

The State Department declares that the discussions will concern the release of Americans - and not such matters as Formisa and a cease-fire off the China coast. Press officer Henry, telling the newsmen - that such questions will not be raised.

Over the weekend, however, Senator George of Georgia, came forth with a suggestion - for a meeting of much wider scope, advocating - a conference between the United States and the Chinese Reds, On all subjects in the Far Eastern crisis. Senator George explains - there's likely to be a flare-up between the Nationalists and theReds, along the China coast. Things have been quiet out there - during the time deleading to the gathering of heads of State at Geneva. But, now, the "summit" affair is over - and a new outbreak of trouble may be expected in the Straits of Formosa.

So Says - Senator George of Georgia - and his is a powerful voice. He - having first suggested the Eisenhower-Eden-Faure-Bulganin performance, which has been the headline of the headlines during the past week.

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EISENHOWER - RAIN

The Mews has been telling, in many words, that President Eisenhower came home from the Geneva conference, yesterday in a Washington rain storm. The President got wet, so did the First Lady. Also - a lot of other dignitaries. At -rainy Washington arport.

So what was the reason? Who was responsible? Jupiter Pluvius, in a way - but also, Vice President Nixon. No, Dick Nixon did not cause the rainfall. But he was responsible, just the same, for the drenching the President and First Lady got.

The Vice President, in charge of the homecoming ceremony, gave the order - no umbrellas. Although - President and Mrs. Eisenhower might have welcomed an umbrella - held over their heads.

The Nixon injunction was based - on an analogy. What did the umbrella symbolize - in the days leading up to the second World War? Remember the Munich conference - maxma with British Prime Minister Chamberlain and his umbrella? Munich became a symbol for appeasement - and so did the Chamberlain umbrella.

Dick Nixon has a lively sense of humor - and good publicity sense. Most positively, definitely and certainly - the Eisenhower trip to Geneva was not any appeasement. But the umbrella might have got a laugh - with sarcastic remarks.

Better the President and First Lady brave the rain and than keep dry - with an umbrella.

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HAYMES

Crooner Dick Haymes will not be deported. The Federal Government has abandoned its long legal fight - to toss him out of the country. So announced - by the Department of Justice.

The affair of Dick Haymes goes back to the fact - that, in World War Two, the crooner claimed exemption from the draft, because he was an alien. He's a native of Argentina.

Later he married actress Rita Hayworth - and, in the course of a strenuous courtship, he went out to see her in Hawaii. When he came back, the Federal authorities claimed that, as an alien, he had re-entered the country illegally. So they began proceedings to deport him.

Last May, in an appeal, a Federal Judge dismissed the government's accusation. Ruling - that Hawaii is a geographical part of the United States. Consequently - Haymes was not returning to the United States at all, when he came back from Hawaii. So now, the Department of Justice says - there will be no appeal from this decision. The case - dropped.

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At the First National Bank of Jersey City, today, a check was handed across the table. A twenty-five million dollar check - for multi-millionaire Howard Hughes. In that way, the deal for RKO was consummated. Purchased - by General Tele-Radio, of which Thomas F. O'Neill is President.

There's another baseball figure whom, I think, they should put in the Cooperstown Hall of Fame. The jack rabbit - the dynamite they put in the baseball, after Babe Ruth made the home run so profitable. The jack rabbit ball - introducing a new area.

So here's my nomination for the baseball Hall of Fame the fellow with long ears, and the long, lively hop. From the home plate - over the fence. Baseball hero - Home Run Jack Rabbit.
