In the Middle east - Israel today accused Egypt of three "grave violations" -of the present mid-east cease fire; charging that three waves of Egyptian reconnaissance planes - had flown over Israeli held territory. However, Cairo - promptly rejection the large made the Israeli accusation. Further, charging on its own - have been that U S U-two planes spying for Israel.

On Capitol Hill - a temporary setback today for President Nixon's proposed anti-pollution pact on
leaded gasolines. The House Ways and Means Committee voting to kill the measure at least till the next session
of Congress. Committee chairman Wilbur Mills saying:
"We just didn't know enough about it." And he added:
"We didn't know the whys and the wherefores particularly the whys." And so - the committee voting
otherwise.

Later on though - the President scoring a major legislative victory; with the Senate taking up again that bill he vetoed - the one that would have limited campaign spending for radio and television. The Senate taking it up and turning it down flat.

At Budapest, Hungary - a meeting of the Hungarian Communist party. Special guests including Soviet Communist party leader Brezhnev - also, a number of lesser Iron Curtain leaders. Hungary's Janos Kadar the keynote speaker; asserting that Hungary is ready to establish diplomatic ties with West Germany - as soon as Bonne succeeds in cementing relations with other Communist countries. Kadar adding that Hungary's policy over the next four years - will be one of saxsfua careful liberalism at home; and abroad -- total solidarity with Russia.

Back in Moscow; - Russia and Red China were
nearing a formal reconciliation, Peking's Liu Hsin
Chuan -- meeting today with Soviet Foreign Minister
Andrei Gromyko; clearing the way for Liu to present
his credentials to Soviet President Podgorny -- as of
tomorrow; when he will become Red China's first
Ambassador to the Soviet Union - in more than four
years.

At the Vatican in Rome -- a ruling today from Pope Paul -- that Cardinals eighty, or older may not vote for his successor. The Pontiff also harring Cardinals eighty or over from serving in the Roman Curia, the church's central government. In addition. the Pope asking Cardinals who head the Curia's various departments -- to hand in their resignations when they reach the age of seventy-five; explaining that he alone will judge whether to accept the resignations. All of which has revived speculation that Pope Paul - who is seventy-three - might be panning himself to resign soon. From Dacca in storm stricken East Pakistan a progress report today from Jurg Vittani - a relief
specialist of the League of Red Cross societies; who
says that earlier difficulties in getting aide to East
Pakistan's flood victims - have now been overcome.
Adding that the Red Cross Relief program - is now
in full swing.

Vittani also cites figures - showing that "two and a half million persons were affected by the disaster;" including a half million or so - still in dire need of food. But **six** assistance must and will reach them -- said he - "within the next ten days."

of Ivy League doctors and educators - calling themselves the "Value of Life's Committee; an appeal to President Nixon to rescind a Pentagon order - allegedly permitting "abortion on demand" at the defense installations "in several states."
