In the affair Pueblo - a deadly calm today; on the surface - at least.

The U N Security Council finding itself stymied -- in the face of a Soviet-American deadlock. Finally, cancelling a scheduled meeting this afternoon when it became apparent there was no "give" yet on either side. While in Washington - the White House would say only that President Johnson was working through "a number of diplomatic channels" still striving to free the Pueblo - and her crew of eighty-three. Even as Russia, Red China and North Vietnam were reaffirming - a solid Red line of support for North Korea.

How long will it all last? A clue maybe to

the nation's mood - in the words of Senate minority

Leader Everett Dirksen; decrying today "the passage

of time"; the "fearful con counsels of watchful waiting"...

the "thin apologies" and "lame excuses" so far in the Pueblo crisis. The great danger - said Everett Dirksen - that these will "transquilize us into a state of humiliation in the eyes of the world -- and perhaps imperil our nation further."

Meanwhile, in Vietnam - as well as most

of Asia -- millions today celebrated Tet - the lunar

New Year. Everywhere - it seems - but in and around

Khe Sanh -- near that supposedly demilitarized zone.

There - the U S command today cancelling

a scheduled thirty-six hour New Year's truce. Pointing

to nearby North Vietnamese troop concentrations
estimated at around forty thousand. troops. As one

American officer put it: "This is no longer infiltration
this is invasion." Hence - no let-up.

World War Two.

The President adding that the war in Vietnam

- may force him to ask for more. He insisted though
this is a budget of "sacrifices and hard choices."

Its dual task - he went on - that of maintaining pressure

on the Communists in Southeast Asia - and, at

the same time, combating social unrest on the streets

of America.

Republican reaction -- it's too much - we'll have to cut it.

Elsewhere in Washington - the Supreme

Court today all but nullified a Nineteen Fifty Four

anti-gambling law. Ruling that a gambler cannot be

prosecuted for failure to register with the government
or for failure to pay special taxes - if he claims that

such acts would involve possible self-incrimination.

The high court - similarly stocks striking down a second law, requiring anyone possessing a sawed-off shotgun - to register with the government.

Grounds - same as before: possible self-incrimination.
